REV. FATHER TOBIN TO MCLARY'S EMPLOYEES

Subject Was "Thorns of the Workingman"—An Able Address.

Rev. Father Tobin, the assistant rector of St. Mary's Church, addressed the employees of the McLary Company at the factory yesterday, his subject being the "Thorns of the Workingman."

Over 500 men were present, and the address was very much appreciated. Father Tobin stated that the workingman's life is the first place is one of privation. He pointed out the pleasures of a workingman's life: the pure Havanas, fine linen, fur-lined coats in winter, and Panama hats in the summer, but must support himself and family—very often a large one. He must wear ready-made clothing, and must deprive himself of very many enjoyments.

In the second place his life is one of dependence, as the average workingman is not his own master; his hours are fixed by his employer; he is frequently compelled to endure long periods of enforced idleness, and is sometimes placed under foremen who are venal taskmasters.

A workingman's life must also be one of obedience, he claimed, as all men are not equal in talent, intellect or skill, and which means that there must be social inequalities as long as the world lasts. Some must rule, others obey.

All social inequalities are founded on the principle of authority and obedience, despite the unworkable schemes of socialists and socialist reformers.

Father Tobin then suggested different means of converting the "thorns" into roses. Contention is the first means, he said, for no man is as happy as the workingman who secures a fair wage and who is content with his lot, as others and himself, very frequently, entail anguish of mind.

There is an over-riding Providence to guide everything, and no man's lot is fixed by chance, but he is satisfied with the will of Heaven, continued Father Tobin.

In concluding, Father Tobin stated that all men should endeavor to give their minds and hearts from earth to Heaven, where there is an everlasting reward for all humane labor.

The speaker also thanked the management of the McLary Company, the St. Mary's Church, which invited him to address them.

Mrs. Whaley was born near Brampton, the daughter of John Adam Snyder, who was with Brock at Queenston Heights. Her great-grandfather was with Wolfe on the Plains of Abraham. With her husband, who died 12 years ago, Mrs. Whaley came to Toronto, from Wellesley Township, Waterloo County, in 1855. She leaves one son, Rev. Mr. Whaley, of the London Conference, and two daughters.

138 PEOPLE ON THE INDIAN LIST

Largest Number of Any City Near Its Size in Canada.

At the present time there are 138 people on the Indian list in London. This is the largest number, it is said, of any city of the size in the country. It does not mean that there is more drunkenness, however, but that the law is more strictly enforced. One of the features of the list is that there is a whole family on it, including a father, mother, daughter and two sons.

LIVERY SOLD.

The sale of the horses and rigs of Hymers & Evans, livery stable, took place yesterday afternoon, the proceeds of the sale amounting to about \$5,000. Sixteen horses were sold by Mr. A. M. Hunt, the auctioneer, in 45 minutes, rather good work. All of them brought good prices.

A young man named Sid Lowery, of King street, has been summoned to appear before Magistrate Love tomorrow morning for assaulting a Chinaman on Talbot street last night.

Outlook is Bright.

March 4, Settling Day, will apparently have few terrors this year. From all sides, there come assurances that merchants and others are meeting their paper very promptly. "The outlook is very bright," said Mr. R. Arkell, of the Imperial Bank. "Everybody seems to be meeting their paper with promptness, and there seems to be no reason for any fear. Everybody seems prosperous."

The champion "Marathon pianist," as he is called in the United States, is a young Kentucky medical student, named Harding, who without pause played vigorously for 36 hours 36 minutes. When he finished the tips of his fingers were black and blue, and his arms were swollen to twice their natural size.

EMPIRE'S PERIL LIES IN INDIA

No Danger of War With Germany Says Prof. McCurdy.

A POLICE NAVY NEEDED

In Address Before Canadian Club He Warns Against Contribution of Dreadnoughts.

That the empire's danger was where her responsibility is greatest, and that, therefore, India, not Germany, was the empire's danger point, was the burden of the remarks of Professor McCurdy, of Toronto University, in speaking on "Canada's naval policy at the Canadian Club luncheon today."

He declared that Canada's assumption of responsibility in national defence would ultimately mean that Canada would be thrust into wars that were of benefit to Great Britain alone, and perhaps in some cases into unrighteous wars, from which she should be free. "My general position," said the speaker, "is that we have no need of a Canadian imperial navy."

War Scare Over. "Whom are we going to fight? Nobody, at present—the war scare is over. There is no present danger. The future danger? Is it Germany? No, because no great state keeps in permanent antagonism for so long a time, because of sober second thought, and we know that influence of all sorts are bringing England and Germany together."

As international prejudices are fluctuating, and temporal it is impossible to say from whom the danger would come. Not from any European power, for the workingmen and the public conscience would not permit it. "If we were to fight at all it will be with some border people—that is the United States—and there are only two men I think would endorse the view that a war with the United States is desirable. One of them lives in Toronto, and the other is in Parliament. This, in any event, would mean defensive war, and we do need a police navy. We are not far from enough to deny this. But the naval bill did not mean this. The occasion was the supposed need of the empire."

"What is it that we are going to defend? That is the question for us to consider. The difficulty is that we do not try to get to the bottom of the dispute. In the present instance biased and rabid statements have been made concerning the present attitude of Germany, and no one has taken on his conscience the correction of these misstatements."

"It is understood that if we contribute to the navy, then we embark on any struggle that nominally is of interest to the empire at large, but really to England."

"We do not form a social unit with the other parts of the empire. We are not an economic unit. Protectionist Canada cannot be a unit with free trade England. We are not a commercial unit, nor yet a governmental unit. The base of our unity is sentimental."

A Sentimental Unity.

The speaker then went on to trace the growth of this sentimental unity, showing how the empire had come into being. "The colonized elements," he continued, "will hold to the empire naturally, but the conquered nations will only be held by force. England's war cannot be in Europe, but it will be in Asia. Not with Japan, possibly with China, if China copies the methods of the western powers, and the danger point is where her responsibilities are greatest, and that is India, and we are bound to know more about our fellow-citizens in India. There is now an Indian national press publishing in France, who are sending the propaganda over the world. And it is in this that the imperial danger lies."

"We have responsibilities for the future. Supposing war should come with India, what would our navy do? Instead of sending Dreadnoughts to England let us give her what we owe—sentiment, and understanding of her problems. If we create that navy now we might be drawn into unrighteous wars. If England were compelled to go to India, should we be so compelled? But if we build this navy then surely it will be launched out to bombard Indian ports, and to aid in putting down those people who are striving to be free, and are holding their highest ambition to become a people such as we. What of the economic conditions? The needs of the navy will be before the needs of our own people, and hamper our own best interests. What is the explanation of all this desire for more and larger navies? It is not an enemy against Germany. It is an inherited instinct for inter-racial hatred. It is fighting instinct at the root of it."
