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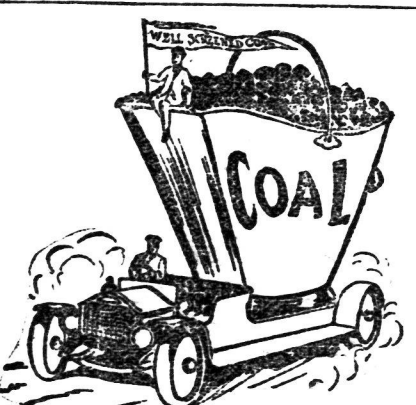

300 DELEGATES AT MISSIONARY MEETING

Women's Home Mission Society of Presbyterian Church Will Convene Here Next Week.

The general meeting of the Women's Home Mission Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, western section, which comprises Quebec, Ontario and the western provinces, will be held in St. Andrew's Church, this city, on Tuesday afternoon next, and it is expected that there will be three hundred delegates from as far east as Quebec, and as far west as the coast, in attendance.

The session will open with a reception to the delegates on Tuesday evening from 5 o'clock to 8:30. Here the hostesses will meet the delegates and conduct them to their homes.

The first business meeting will be held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, when, after the opening exercises, an address of welcome will be read by Mrs. Rollins on behalf of the London Presbyterian Home Missionary Society, and the Presbyterian women of London.

On Wednesday there will be an open session addressed by Rev. R. M. Dickey, the first missionary to the subject, "Pioneer Days Among the Gold-Seekers of the Klondike." This lecture will be illustrated with stereoscopic views.

On Thursday evening there will be another open session addressed by Rev. E. D. McLaren, B. D., of Toronto, home missionary superintendent of the Presbyterian Church. Rev. J. D. Byrnes, B. A., of Cobalt, and Rev. J. A. Macdonald, L.L.D., editor of the Toronto Globe.

SPECIAL ORGANIZER FOR THE A. O. U. W.

Convention at Toronto Puts Through and Discusses Important Business.

Toronto, March 17.—With 450 delegates in attendance and Grand Master W. S. B. Morris presiding, the thirty-second annual convention of the Ancient Order of United Workmen was opened yesterday in Temple Building and will conclude today. Among the delegates are four ladies: Mrs. Rosabelle Todd, Niagara-on-the-Lake; Mrs. Sara A. Kinsella, North Bay; Mrs. M. McGillis, Regal Lodge, Ottawa; and Miss A. L. Boddy, Lady Minto Lodge, Toronto.

Dr. W. D. Cowan, of Regina, P. G. W. M., of the Grand Lodge of the Canadian Northwest, is present as western delegate. In the report of the committee on labor, presented by Mr. J. B. Nixon, it was recommended that grand masters of lodges be given power to suspend officers of subordinate lodges against whom charges are made, and to reinstate them if such charges are not proven. The clause, though recommended by the executive, aroused considerable discussion, and as a two-thirds vote is required to change the constitution the motion was declared lost.

Dr. J. M. Cotton, grand medical examiner, reported that the average age of the 3,855 applicants was 25 years and 6 months. Of the 516 deaths last year the average age was 60 years and 4 months. Mr. F. G. Inwood, grand treasurer, certified to the healthy condition of the finances. Special reference was made to the death of Col. Melville D. Dawson, past grand master workman.

The report of the special committee on organization was the most important question to engage the attention at this session. Grand Treasurer F. G. Inwood presented the report, and its adoption without amendment was very gratifying to the committee. It provides for the engagement of a general organizer who shall have full charge of the organization work subject to the supervision of the organization board. Toronto was selected as the next place of meeting. The election of officers takes place this morning, when Mayor Geary will extend a civic welcome. Major J. J. Craig, M. P. P., is the incoming grand master workman.

THOMPSON SETON ON WILD ANIMALS

Greatest of Animal Story Writers at Auditorium This Afternoon and Tonight.

The greatest of animal story writers, Ernest Thompson Seton, reached the city today, and will speak this afternoon and tonight in the Auditorium on wild animals. He addressed the Canadian Club at noon today.

The Toronto Globe says of his lectures: Association Hall was crowded last night on the occasion of the lecture by Mr. Ernest Thompson Seton, the famous portrayer of wild animals. Probably the most interesting part of the lecture to many of those present was the running of the wolves, not the lecture upon the motives prompting the action of the wolves, and the almost human reasoning followed by them in their efforts to escape from man.

The various calls of the wolves, not to him discordant howling, though gruesome and eerie, but all having a meaning and a purpose, were reproduced by Mr. Thompson Seton with wonderful fidelity to the real animal utterance.

He pointed out some of the benefits of the greater attention paid now to animals and their habits and anatomy in the increased knowledge of the human body, one being the discovery of a hitherto overlooked sense, that of orientation, the knowledge of the head and especially the ear of homing pigeons.

The lecture was illustrated by a

number of remarkable views at close range of the creatures of the wild, and Mr. Seton pleaded strongly the advantages of the newer mode of hunting, with camera rather than gun, marking the growing human feeling towards animals.

U. S. MUST PAY

Should Provide Ticket Home For Woman Deported.

Windsor, Ont. March 17.—Six weeks ago a Mrs. Fowler, who came from Stratford to Detroit a year ago and was later deserted by her husband, was deported from Detroit by the United States immigration officers, who gave her a ferry ticket and practically dumped her upon Windsor. Mayor Hanna placed the woman in the care of the Salvation Army and demanded that the United States immigration department pay her fare to her former home. This was refused. Mr. Hanna then took the matter up with Ottawa, with the result that his position is sustained and he is instructed to take the case up again with the Detroit officials and report the result to the department at Ottawa, which will cooperate with him.
