SANATORIUM OPENED BY GOVERNOR-GENERAL MADE-IN-LONDON EXHIBITION THROWN OPEN VICE-REGAL PARTY GIVEN ROYAL WELCOME

Immense Crowds and a Guard of Honor Met Their Excellencies at Grand Trunk Depot.

GOLDEN KEY WAS GIVEN THE EARL

Opening of Institution to Fight Tuberculosis an Impressive One—Brilliant Scene at the Armories This Afternoon.

All nature and circumstances conspired today to make the visit of His Excellency Earl Grey, Lady Grey, Lady Sybil Grey and Lady Aileen Roberts, a most memorable one. Fine weather greeted them on their arrival, and the warm welcome of the citizens generally must have been pleasing to them.

The sanatorium was officially opened by his excellency at noon, and later the "Made-in-London" exhibition was started on its way.

The party arrived in the city at 11:58 over the Grand Trunk.

Accompanying their excellencies were Lady Sybil Grey, Lady Aileen Roberts, Lord Lansdale, aide-de-camp to his excellency, and his secretary.

As the train drew up, the private car Cornwall was stopped nearly opposite the centre of the depot, and Lord Lansdale alighted.

THE PARTY ALIGHT
Hon. Adam Beck met him, and with his Worship Mayor Beattie were introduced to his excellency. After congratulating Mr. Beck on his good fortune in having such fine weather, his excellency and lady alighted.

As they did so, the Seventh Regiment Band struck up "God Save the King."

All heads were bared until the anthem was completed.

His excellency was then introduced to the aldermen, members of the board of education, hospital trust, library board, separate school board, and many other leading citizens.

The guard of honor from the Seventh Regiment, under command of Capt. Campbell Becher, was then inspected by his excellency and his aides.

Col. Hodgins and his staff, consisting of Col. A. J. Smith, Col. Campbell, Major Shannon, Major Kaye, Major McCrimmon and Major L. Leonard, assisted in this work.

THE GUARD OF HONOR
The guard presented a fine appearance. They were smart, soldierly-looking fellows, and acquitted themselves with distinction. Lieut. Ware was second in command, and Lieut. Brown was in charge of the colors.

His Excellency congratulated Capt. Becher on the fine appearance of the men. During the inspection the band played "O Canada," the Canadian National Anthem.

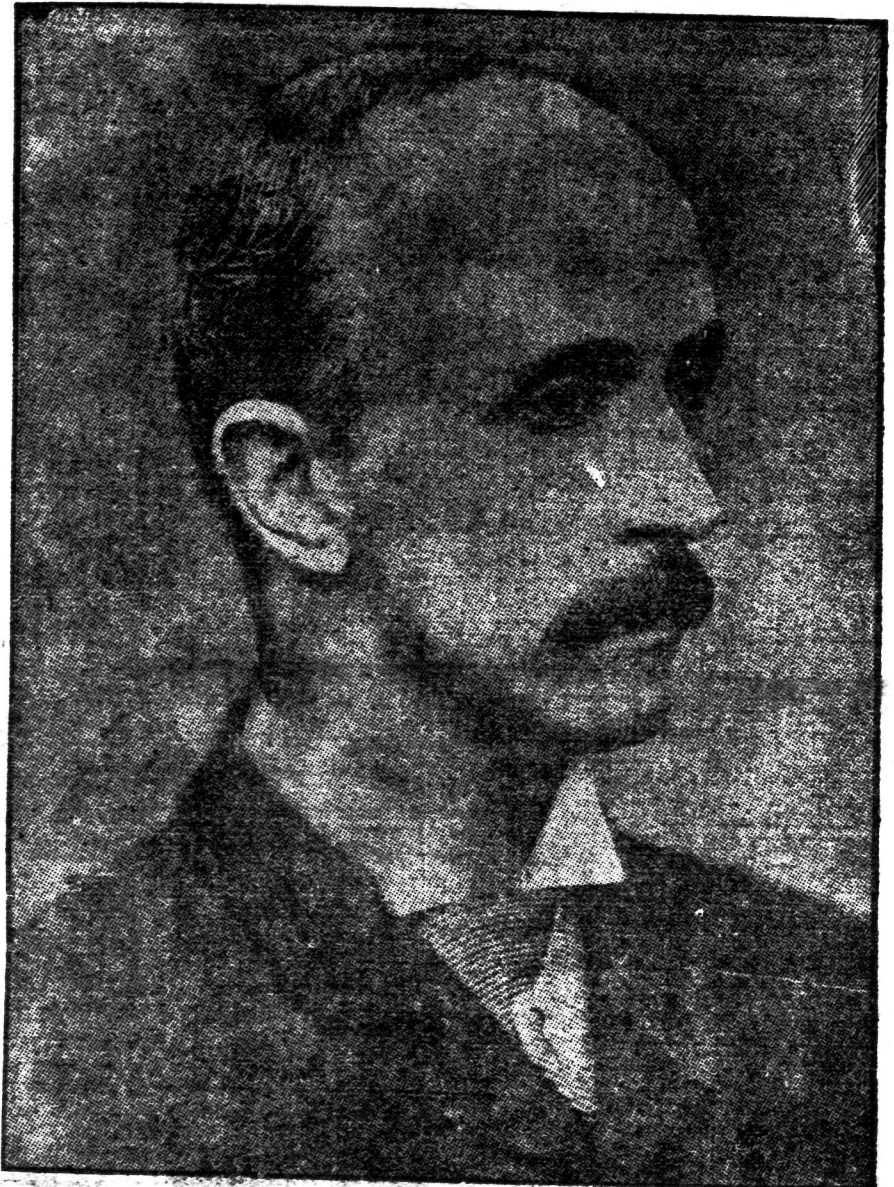
Earl Grey and his party were then escorted to the automobiles in waiting for them.

Governor-General of Canada, Who Opened the London Health Association's Sanatorium and the Made-in-London Exhibition Today.

DREADFUL SUICIDE NEAR MONTREAL CITY

Despondent Man Throws Himself in Front of an Express Train and Is Instantly Killed.

Smith's Falls, April 5.—A dreadful suicide is reported from Glen Roy, a small place on the C. P. R. between Smith's Falls and Montreal. William A. Halley's Comet Itinerary

In a letter, John S. Plaskett, who is chief observer at the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, and a graduate of the University of Toronto, says, regarding the comet:

"Halley's Comet is now west of the sun, and may be seen probably with a field glass before sunrise. I have no doubt that in a week or two it should be visible to the naked eye in the east before sunrise, but will probably not be very conspicuous until about May 20, when it will be in the evening sky after sunset."

ADDRESS TO EARL GREY

When His Excellency Earl Grey was introduced to the gathering in the Armories, Mrs. Lillian Beck, on behalf of the ladies of London, read the address to him. It was beautifully engrossed, and was as follows:

To the Right Honorable Sir Albert Henry George, Earl Grey, Viscount Howick, Baron Grey of Howick, in the County of Northumberland in the United Kingdom, and a Baronet, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Victorian Order, etc., Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada.

May It Please Your Excellency—
The women of London desire to take advantage of the present opportunity to express to Your Excellency their high appreciation of the self-denying effort that has induced your attendance at the "Made-in-London" Exhibition, and their recognition of the honor conferred in undertaking its opening.

They recognize in this an added evidence to the many already afforded during your occupancy of your exalted position as the representative in Canada of our beloved Sovereign, of your interest in all that pertains to the advancement of our country and the well-being of its people. In the varied interests for the benefit of our community which Your Excellency has striven to foster, none has more generally appealed to the people of this Dominion than those which endeavor to ally or mitigate the ravages of tuberculosis, and to reduce the economic loss that results. We feel that the women of London in aid of the tuberculosis sanatorium, which Your Excellency this day opened under such encouraging auspices, that you are but continuing the same high-minded devotion to the duties of your office which has marked your career in Canada, and we trust that in the many and varied interests, which in your gracious countenance you have striven to stimulate while in Canada, that now inaugurated by the women of London will not be the least pleasing to you from the reflection that those who have assumed the self-imposed duty of ministering to their fellow-citizens in the grasp of this dread disease have fulfilled the high purpose which they started out to discharge.

We desire to acknowledge in this connection the valued aid extended to the exhibition by the manufacturers of London. They have by their general sympathy with our efforts in the cause which we are organized to further, and the magnificent display of the products of their industry, shown a public spirit which entitles them to the warmest thanks. At the same time it will inform Your Excellency of the growing importance of our city as an industrial centre. Fortunately for our project, it also demonstrates the wide and intelligent sympathy which stimulates them in the effort to ameliorate and improve social conditions in our midst.

Our joint participation with Your Excellency in this day's events will lead us long to remember your contribution by your presence, to the success of our efforts, and cause us to watch with interest, if not with personal regard, your future career in the service of the Empire. In the conviction that wherever duty may call you to service, such will be performed with the one aim of advancing the interest of our country and the welfare of its people.

The present visit of Your Excellency brings added pleasure to our citizens because of the presence of the first time in London of Her Excellency the Countess Grey, and the women of London recognize in her visit an evidence of her abiding concern in all that contributes to the welfare of our people, and which our present undertaking is designed to further, and we desire from this motive especially to extend to her a cordial welcome to our city. We sincerely hope and pray that to her as well as to yourself, may be extended length of days to the accomplishment of the many arduous duties which you both so unselfishly assume in the interest of our growing Dominion and of the glorious Empire of which we, as Canadians, are proud to think we form no inconspicuous part.

GIRL DANCER IN BOY-GARB TAKEN FROM THEATRE STAGE

Police Think Little Golden-Haired Dancer May Have Been Stolen From Her Parents and Are Investigating the Matter.

Pretty little golden-haired Ruth Singer, supposed to have been stolen from her father in Toronto, and brought to this city, is causing the authorities at the Children's Aid shelter no small amount of trouble through her determination to escape from the building and go on the stage. The little one is only 10 years old and from what can be gathered has had a very hard life. She is, it is believed, brought to this city by a woman, who is stated was most intemperate habits, and was living on \$9 a week the child made singing and dancing in nickel shows. She came to this city from Hamilton, where she was also engaged in singing and dancing until the authorities got in touch with the matter, and then, it is said, the woman brought her to London.

Dressed in Boy's Clothes.
Inspector Satchell found the little girl dressed in boy's clothes, singing and dancing in a local theatre, and at once took her in charge as she was leaving the stage. The little girl, it is said, will get back on the boards again, and in a few nights ago, it is stated that she was about to escape from her upstairs bedroom, having knotted the bed clothes together. She was, however, discovered in time to prevent her getting away. Ruth has a splendid voice, and is a very clever dancer, and many people who have seen her have offered to adopt her. The authorities, however, are trying to locate her own people, and restore the child to them.

MR. J. W. HYMAN DEAD AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Well-Known Resident of London Passed Away at His Home Yesterday.

After an illness lasting since October of last year, Mr. J. W. Hyman died at his home, 133 Kent street yesterday afternoon.

For several days Mr. Hyman had been in a most critical condition, and his death was expected at any time. He was 52 years old, and a life-long resident of London.

He was the youngest son of the late Ellis Walton Hyman, and besides his wife, is survived by one son, Ellis, three daughters, Misses Grace, Alice and Laura, of this city, and two brothers, Hon. C. S. Hyman and Mr. Walton J. Hyman, both of London. The funeral, which will be of a private nature, will be held on Wednesday afternoon at Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and Rev. W. T. Hill, of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, will conduct the services.

G. T. BLACKSTOCK ILL

Suffered Nervous Attack at North Bay—Cannot Act for the Crown.

North Bay, Ont., April 4.—George Tate Blackstock, the Toronto lawyer who was assigned as crown prosecutor at the North Bay assizes, opening today, was taken suddenly ill this morning, and confined to his room in the Pacific Hotel. He will not be able to act, and the Attorney-General's department has been notified. It is expected that another crown prosecutor will be appointed, and little delay result. Mr. Blackstock's illness is of a nervous nature, from overwork, and it is expected he will be all right again in a few days.

EARL GREY AT THE ARMORIES OPENING A BRILLIANT AFFAIR

Immense Gathering Saw Address Presented to His Excellency—All the Exhibits in Place—Booths Presented Artistic Appearance—Ladies Congratulated.

The Armories presented a scene of unparalleled beauty when the exhibition was opened by His Excellency Earl Grey.

The brilliant uniforms of the soldiers, the variegated hues of the myriad flowers, and the bright costumes of the women, made a scene never to be forgotten.

When the vice-regal party arrived, there was a great cheer of greeting, which lasted for some time.

They were conducted to a raised dais at the western end of the Armories, where an address was read to him.

His Excellency responded briefly in which he congratulated the ladies of London on the great success of the exhibition.

On the conclusion of the formal exercises the party were taken to the booths and stalls, where the Earl sampled many of the good things offered for sale, and spoke words of congratulation to all concerned.

FEARFUL JAM AT THE DEPOT WHEN THE EARL ARRIVED

Crowds Could Scarcely Be Kept in Order by the Police—People Gave the Vice-Regal Party a Truly Hearty Welcome Today.

The Grand Trunk platform was jammed to suffocation, and the squad of police, under command of Sergeant Birch, had a busy time keeping the throng in order. The guard of honor took their turn in keeping the crowd in reasonable bounds.

Flugs were waved enthusiastically everywhere, and it was evident that it was a very loyal and very happy crowd.

There was a fearful jam about the automobiles when their excellencies were being seated, and it was with no little difficulty that the people were kept from crowding the autos.

A Big Crowd.
Along the line of progress the same was true, and it seemed as if the whole

city was out to do honor to the Governor-General.

The lawn of the sanatorium was crowded, and only with its visitors, but also many from the rural districts, who had driven many miles to see Earl Grey.

On the return journey a large number of school children waved flags and other tokens of their welcome.

They were a joyful, happy crowd, and his excellency commented on the apparent prosperity of the citizens of London.

At the Armories.
At the Armories there was just as great a jam, and inside it was with difficulty that any progress was made.

It was out so noisy a welcome as many notables have received in London, but it was very sincere and very loyal.

HUGHEY JENNINGS SPEAKS OF LONDON

Says Local Fans Are So Kind to Detroit He Wants to Treat Them Right.

Jennings told Mr. Stevely that as the London baseball fans are so friendly to the Tigers, he does not wish to bring the team along before the opening of the season, as the men will not be in the best shape.

However, if Detroit has Sunday ball this year, Hughey is willing to bring the team in for a match Monday afternoon.

While in San Antonio, Mr. Stevely also met Mr. George Primrose, the well-known minstrel man, a former Londoner, who is touring the Southern States with his show.

The ex-mayor spent part of Easter with former City Clerk Kingston, at the latter's home in Santa Ana, California.

While at Riverside, Cal., Mr. and Mrs. Stevely were the guests of Mr. George W. Tackaberry, Mrs. Stevely's brother, who is one of the largest individual fruit growers in California.
