Thomas J. Halpin, of the Boston Athletic Association, and Alvah T. Meyers, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, set the two new world's records. Halpin won the 60-yard run in the new time of 1:13 2-5. Meyers, in the 300-yard run, established a record of :22 1-5.

Frick, of Pittsburg, had seriously contemplated taking an active part in the national game have been current for some time, and though Gilmore would not say Mr. Frick was the man, followers of the game here believe he is the one.

The announcemnt was made after a conversation over the long distance telephone between Gilmore and W. A. Kerr, of Pittsburg, in which the latter is said to have promised that the deal would be closed on Thursday in New York.


