

Mathewson Signs With Giants as Feds Offer Him \$65,000

Big Six Decides To Remain in Organized Ball Before Gilmore's Big Offer Reaches Him—Giants' Terms Not Made Public.

Marlin Springs, Texas, March 2. — President James A. Gilmore, of the United States, has signed a contract with Christy Mathewson, star pitcher of the Giants, for three years at \$65,000. The offer of \$65,000 for a three-year contract made to "Big Six" by President Gilmore, of the Federal League, today signed a contract with the New York club. The terms were not made public. President Gilmore, of the Giants, executed the contract with Mathewson.

Chicago, March 2. — An offer of \$65,000 for three years' service, and an advance of \$15,000 to be paid the minute he signs a Federal League contract, was wired to Christy Mathewson, the star New York Giants' pitcher, today, by Matty-get away if he could help it.

From the brief account of the trouble it appears that Draper will not play baseball again, and that he will lose the sight of his eye. RESERVED SEATS IN BERLIN SOLD IN FIFTEEN MINUTES

Over 100 Fans Were in Line When Plan Opened—O.H.A. is Handling the Sale of Tickets.

Berlin, March 2. — Berlin, March 2. — Indications are that all records for attendance at the auditorium will be broken Tuesday night when Orilla and Berlin intermediates meet in the first game of the finals for the O. H. A. championship. The plan for the reserved seat section opened tonight and over 100 fans were in line. The sale was handled by the O. H. A. and in less than fifteen minutes the entire reserved section was sold out. The intermediates are in good shape for both games, and the confident of being able to secure a safe lead to take to Orilla Friday night. The last intermediate championship came to Berlin in 1907.

MANY RECORDS SHATTERED AT A. A. U. INDOOR MEET

Halpin and Meyers Establish New World Marks in 600 Yard and 300 Yard Races.

New York, March 2.—Five new championship records, two of which established new world's indoor marks, were made at the indoor national championships of the Amateur Athletic Union, held at Madison Square Garden tonight. Two other championship records were equalled.

Thomas J. Halpin, of the Boston Athletic Association, and Alvah T. Meyers, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, set the two new world's records. Halpin won the 600-yard run in the new time of 1:13.25. Meyers, in the 300-yard run, established a record of 32.15.

The other events in which new championship figures were hung up were the two-mile walk, won by Richard F. Remer, Irish-American A. C., in 14:21.45; the 1,000-yard run, won by Abel R. Kiviat, Irish-American C. C., in 2:15.25; and the two mile run, won by Harry J. Smith, Bronx Church House, New York, in 9:18.

Platt Adams, of New York, was a triple winner, winning the standing broad jump and pole vault for distance. Meyers and Patrick J. McDonald, both of the Irish-American A. C., were double winners. In addition to making his record in the 300-yard run, Meyers captured the 24-pound shotput and was first in throwing the 56-pound weight for height.

The championships point banner was won by the Irish-American A. C., with the New York A. C. second and the Boston A. A. third.

The fact that the free-for-all race at the blue ribbon meeting is to be the best three in five heats is causing some talk along the line. Those who have been racing on the small ovals say it is all right.

Hope to Get Sam Crawford Now to Manage Brooklyn.

SEATON FOR CHICAGO TEAM

Pittsburg Millionaire Is Behind That Club According to President Gilmore Work Starts on Chicago Park This Week.

Chicago, March 2.—President Gilmore, of the Federal League, announced tonight that "a Pittsburg millionaire" had decided to become backer of the club in his town. Stories that Henry C. Frick, of Pittsburg, had seriously contemplated taking an active part in the national game have been current for some time, and though Gilmore would not say Mr. Frick was the man, followers of the game here believe he is the one.

The announcement was made after a conversation over the long distance telephone between Gilmore and W. A. Kerr, of Pittsburg, in which the latter is said to have promised that the deal would be closed on Thursday in New York.

Blandin Going Back to Naps.
The telephone conversation led President Gilmore to declare any attempt by organized ball to sign players already signed by the Federal League would be the beginning of a war that would threaten the foundations of the organized game. This statement was made in answer to questions concerning the reported defection of Pitcher Blandin, who, it was said, finally had agreed to join the Cleveland team despite his contract with the Federal League.

It leaked out this afternoon that Tom Seaton, the pitcher last year with Philadelphia, would join the Chicago Federals. It was understood that the Brooklyn club was to get Seaton, but the allotment on Saturday gave him to Tinker's club.

Work on Chicago Park to Start.
Ground will be broken for the local Federal League plant Wednesday, President Weegham said today. The contractors agreed to have the stand finished by April 21.

Much disappointment was shown by the Federal managers when it was learned that Christy Mathewson had signed a contract with the Giants and had not waited for their offer of \$65,000 for three years, made today in a telegram by President Gilmore. Mathewson was wanted to manage and pitch on the Brooklyn team, but efforts will be made to get Sam Crawford, the Detroit outfielder, for the job, while President Gilmore intimated that Filder Jones, former manager of the Chicago White Sox, might be made an offer.

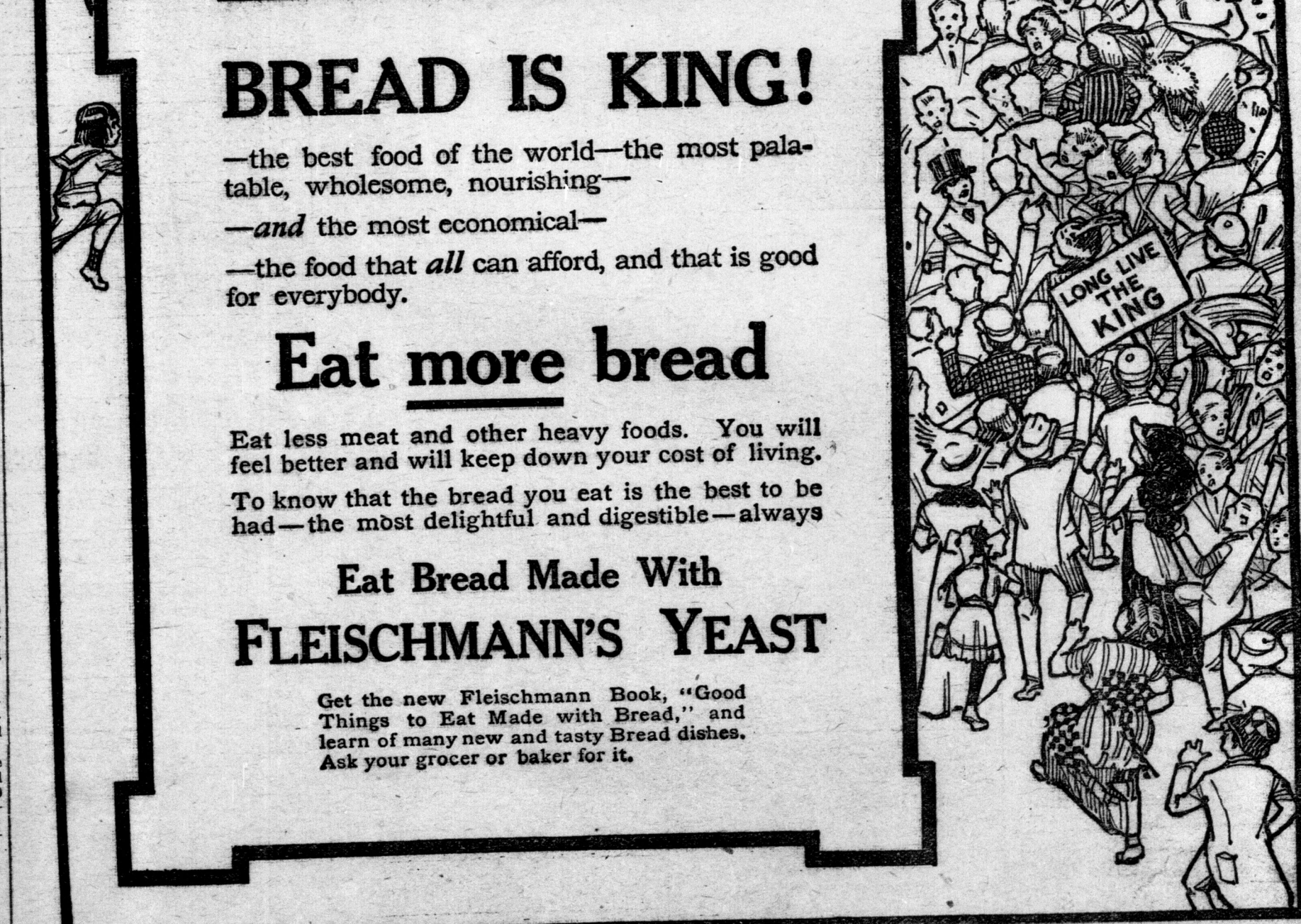
