COSGROVE TRIAL SET FOR OCT. 23

Change Charge From Shooting To Murder At Preliminary Hearing.

Counsel For Defense Does Not Put in Any Evidence.

OWEN SOUND, Sept. 7.—John Cosgrove, deaf mute, of Proton Township, was formally committed for trial at the next court of competent jurisdiction, the fall sittings, on Oct. 23, after a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Cressor this afternoon. The charge had been changed from shooting to that of murder.

The hearing lasted about an hour and a half, and the defense did not put in any evidence.

W. J. Campbell of the Belleville Institute for the Deaf and Dumb was interpreter, and he conveyed the questions and answers to the prisoner rapidly and clearly. He seemed to have considerable difficulty in keeping the attention of the prisoner, and had frequently to ask Cosgrove to look at him. Cosgrove appeared to want to watch the witnesses. When Magistrate Cressor announced that he would send the accused up for trial, and the prisoner was given a chance to speak after being warned, he declined to make a statement. He showed great interest in the hearing, but at no time did he express any feeling other than that of alert interest.

Attends Priest.

Miss Kate Connolly was the first witness. She told of the arrival of Father Clohecy at her parents' home on the evening of the shooting, Aug. 19, and of his condition. He came into the house and called her to his room. He asked her to open his coat. She did so and found his shirt covered with blood. The priest died at her home on Aug. 23.

Michael Connolly, the second witness, said his home was about 200 yards from St. Patrick's Church. Father Clohecy had been a big, stout, healthy man of 36 or 37. He saw Father Clohecy leave his home about dark on Aug. 19 and go to the church. He saw him later come to the house again and go inside. When witness went into the house a little later he found Father Clohecy on a bed, bleeding from a wound in the breast. He stated there was no other dead mute in that neighborhood except the prisoner.

Find No Weapon.

The witness also told of an occasion about May 1, when John Cosgrove had attacked the priest as the latter got up from his breakfast in the Connolly home. Cosgrove caught him by the collar and shook him, and made a move as if to take something from his hip pocket. There had been stories that he carried a revolver, and he was stopped from taking anything from his pocket, but it was found that there was no weapon there.

John Connolly, son of the last witness, said he met Cosgrove between 7:30 and 8 p.m. on Aug. 19 on the road going toward St. Patrick's Church, and about 200 rods from the church. He had a rifle with him.

William Caughlin was called. He stated he knew Cosgrove, the accused, for about ten years. The latter was working for him on Aug. 19. He left the house about 7:45 p.m. He did not see Cosgrove take anything with him. Cosgrove had a rifle at witness' place. The rifle was kept in different parts of the barn, garage and in the house. Witness said the prisoner, in referring to Clohecy, made it plain that he did not like the latter. He would say "No good" when he saw a religious picture.

Down On Churches.

James Woodgate, merchant, stated he saw Cosgrove about an average of once in two weeks. By his actions and talk he was down on the churches and priest and things connected with religion. He would say "No good" when speaking of them. When Father Clohecy would be seen going up the road to the church Cosgrove would make motions as if shooting at the priest from behind bushes with a repeater rifle. He would write "Clohecy, hell." This occurred at least four times.

"Cosgrove seemed to be religious crazy," the witness volunteered. To the defense the witness said the prisoner had not tried to hide his feelings toward the priest and the church, but rather tried to show them.

William Rice, an uncle of the prisoner, said that the latter had given money to the priest. He was told that the police would take him if he did not watch out, and the prisoner had gone away apparently insulted.

Patrick Ryan swore that the prisoner had made signs that he would shoot Father Clohecy.

THROWS ACID IN GIRL'S FACE

TORONTO, Sept. 7.—With her face and shoulders badly burned by carbolic acid thrown by William Colclough, aged 40 and married, Jean Robinson, aged 28, is in the general hospital. While she will recover, the sight of her right eye is impaired and she will probably be badly disfigured. Her assailant, who swallowed some of the poison remaining in the bottle, is also in the hospital, but his condition is not serious.

Colclough is separated from his wife. He went to Miss Robinson's room this afternoon, and uncorking the bottle of poison, dashed the contents into her face.

HELD FOR FORGING NAME OF FATHER

WINDSOR, Sept. 7.—Vernon Meston, 26 years old, a young farmer of Gosfield North, was arrested last night by a county constable and brought to Windsor to be charged with forging his father's name to a note for \$350.

Meston, the constable alleges, took the note to the Union Bank in Essex and attempted to discount it. The note purported to be indorsed by Meston's father.

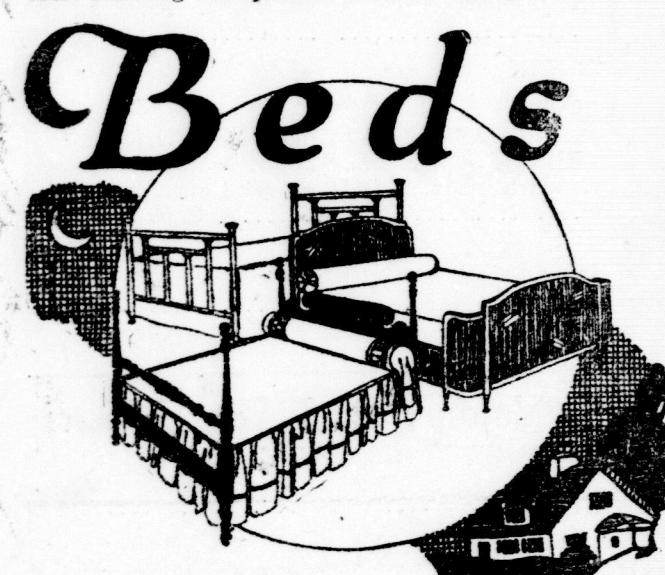
