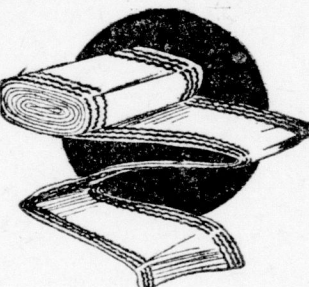

LAVISH SETTINGS

The sterner gender fare miserably at the hands of Pola Negri in her latest picture, "Men." WIT AND DRAMA SCORE SUCCESS

Light, Sparkling Entertainment by McGarry Players Adequate For Summer.

EXPERTLY BALANCED

The light, sparkling entertainment as much a necessity for a summer evening as a cool sparkling drink is adequately furnished at the Grand Theatre this week with the Garry McGarry Players in their production of "Six Cylinder Love."

The comedy-drama, famous after an unusually successful run in New York, is one of the most delightful plays that the company have yet accomplished. It is a comedy in which the drama is still new and zesty; its little touches of drama instantly appeal to the sympathies.

The whole play is one of the most expertly balanced compositions of light wit and earnest sincerity that one could well ask. The remainder of the company all contributed handsomely to the general success of the play, in which an important factor was the general excellence of stage settings and costumes.

BUY HOME TOMATOES AND CUCUMBERS NOW

How many housewives realize the advantage of purchasing home-grown in preference to imported vegetables? London greenhouse growers are opening a campaign to impress the point and educate the public to the advantage. Right now attention is being directed to home-grown tomatoes and cucumbers.

A statement issued yesterday points out that there is a great deal of difference between the home-grown and imported cucumber. The home product is grown off the ground, and is placed in local stores a few hours after being picked. The imported product is left to mature to a greater degree on the ground, and by the time it gets to London, the statement said, the cucumber is a week or more old. It may be distinguished from the home-grown product by white and yellow spots or a nonuniformity in color. The home product is a very rich green and is "edible, while the imported product is hardly fit to eat."

Practically the same thing holds true, the statement said, with regard to tomatoes. Home-grown brands are picked ripe and are really most delightful. The imported tomato is picked green and by the time it has come en route and in the stores a rot sets in, which soon destroys it. "Ask for home-grown vegetables," is the slogan of the London greenhouse growers.
