

M. C. R. SPECIALS MAKE NEW MARKS

Wolverine Fliers Average 70-Mile Clip From Detroit To Falls.

St. Thomas, June 7.—Three non-stop M. C. R. trains, carrying the members of the Detroit Falls club for a day's outing, set a record this morning, making the 240-mile dash from Windsor to the Falls in 198 minutes, 200 minutes and 203 minutes.

For several days the three big passenger locomotives which were to haul the trains have been undergoing repairs at the local shops. They were given a fresh coat of paint and the wheels were edged with white steel. The engines and coaches were decorated with banners and ribbons, which flapped back and forth as the trains rushed through the city at a 40-mile-an-hour clip.
Center street was lined with waiting people watching the fleeting trains. The first one went through at 9:56, the second at 10:03 and the third at 10:27. An average clip of 70 miles an hour had been maintained through the country, which was lowered to 40 miles in the city. All the level crossings in the city were guarded by watchmen to protect the public.
General Superintendent J. L. McKee travelled on the first train, J. E. Jennings, general superintendent of motive power, was on the second, and the assistant superintendent of motive power, Mr. Kneeseley, was on the third. Local men who were travelling in an official capacity were Trainmaster McIlroy, R. D. McDonald, G. M. Fulton, road foreman of engines, District Passenger Agent C. L. Slinger, and Superintendent Donahue. Two firemen rode on each engine, and the best men on the road were at the front. The last non-stop trip that was tried was many years ago, when the trip was made in 217 minutes.

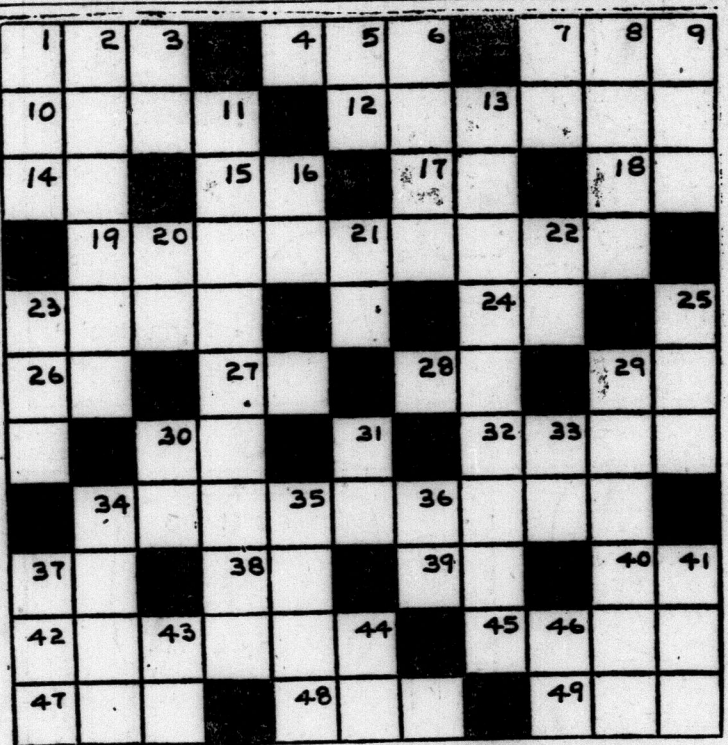

INGERSOLL LOSES BUSINESS LEADER

James B. Thompson Is Called by Death—Ill For Several Months.

Ingersoll, June 7.—The unexpected death in the Hamilton General hospital on Saturday of James B. Thompson has removed one of the best-known and most highly-esteemed residents of this town. Since February Mr. Thompson had been in impaired health, but his death, which followed an operation, came as a shock to citizens generally. He was in his 68th year, was born in Dereham township and for 37 years lived there. During the greater part of that time he had been very closely associated with the business affairs of the town. He was public-spirited and always deeply interested in the affairs of the town. He had served very acceptably as a member of the council, the agricultural society and the board of education, having been chairman of the latter body. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. A. Leo Law, of Ingersoll, and two sons, Wilbur Thompson, of Montreal, and John B. Thompson, of Niagara Falls. William Thompson, King street west, is a brother. The remains were brought here on Saturday and the funeral will be held Monday afternoon from the family residence, Canterbury street, to the Harris street cemetery.
Following a somewhat extended illness, Miss Mary Roach died today at the family residence, King street east. Miss Roach had spent the greater part of her life in Ingersoll and was highly esteemed by many friends. She is survived by three sisters. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at the Ingersoll rural cemetery.

BARN IN W. ZORRA SWEEP BY FLAMES

Seven Calves, Grain and New Auto Go Up in Smoke.

Embro, June 7.—Seven calves, 600 bushels of oats, 50 bushels of wheat, 7 tons of hay, a new auto, and a quantity of farm implements, were lost in a fire which destroyed the barn on the farm of Thomas Morris of West Zorra township on Friday night. The cause of the fire is not known.
Mr. Morris' son, on returning home, drove the coupe into the barn, and did not notice anything wrong, but before he got to the house, he noticed the building in flames. He hurried back and was able to save a motor truck, but could not do more. Neighbors rushed to render aid, but despite their best efforts, the building and contents went up in flames.
There is some insurance, but the loss will amount to about \$6,000.

Ingersoll Chief Warns Bathers

Greek Bandits Defy Police

Athens, June 7.—A Greek naval squadron today surrounded the island of Samos lying off the west coast of Asia Minor, which is in the hands of two brigands, the Vafiades brothers, and their adherents. Troops will be landed on the island tonight to put down the uprising.
The revolutionaries have demanded the resignation of the government and the election of a new assembly. They have liberated all prisoners, who have joined them in the revolt, and have also seized the funds of the treasury of the island.

CANADA TO POLICE ISLANDS IN ARCTIC

Will Organize Administration Body For Dominion's Discoveries.

Vancouver, B.C., June 8.—The Sunday Province says: "During this summer Canada will organize an administrative body and police for all the islands that have been discovered in the Arctic region, and which the dominion claims as part of this country."

For this purpose George P. Mackenzie, gold commissioner of the Yukon, who has arrived from the north, has been given the assignment, that, in point of territory over which he becomes the chief executive, is the most extensive that has been placed under the jurisdiction of any person heretofore, for it embraces that part of the Arctic on the Atlantic Ocean side as well as the Pacific. The first expedition to bring order into the Arctic outposts and to report on the natural resources of the far-off Canadian possessions, will leave on July 1, under the leadership of Mr. Mackenzie, who will have a staff of geologists and other experts in this party. En route to Ottawa to complete preparations for the first expedition, which will be to the North Atlantic, Mr. Mackenzie has arrived here.

While he would not deny the new undertaking to which he has been assigned, Mr. Mackenzie had nothing to say regarding the government's plans for the administration of the new territory.

TROOPS TO QUELL SAMOS UPRISING

Revolution on Grecian Island Is Started by Brigands.

Athens, Greece, June 8.—A Greek naval detachment has been landed and martial law declared to suppress an uprising on the island of Samos, off the Asia Minor coast. The movement is headed by the Vafiades brothers, brigands, who took refuge on the island to escape arrest. Their first move was to seize the government buildings, deport the authorities and cut the lines of communication.

Civilian officials, soldiers and gendarmes expelled from Samos by the insurgents, declare their number about 450, including some released prisoners. They are armed with rifles taken from the soldiers and gendarmes, whom they surprised while asleep.

The island has been blockaded to prevent the escape of the insurgents, and reports received here say the situation does not seem very disquieting.
The inhabitants gave a favorable reception to the landing party under Captain Demetaska, and the latter reports that only a small proportion of the islanders have joined the movement.

Revolt Leader Killed In Chile

Uprising in Northern Provinces Has Been Crushed.

Santiago, Chile, June 7.—The uprising in the northern provinces has been crushed by the Chilean troops, an official communique issued today announces.

Owing to the resistance of sub-verters, the Chilean troops, "thirty of them were killed and a number wounded. The leader of the revolt is among the dead."
Four hundred prisoners were taken to Iquique, capital of the province of Tarapaca. The troops sustained no casualties.

A considerable quantity of explosives, including 75 cases of dynamite, was captured. Communist agitators will be severely punished.

WILLIAM H. DAN DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Lifelong Resident of London Township Passes at Victoria Hospital.

A lifelong resident of London township, William H. Dan, died in Victoria hospital on Saturday night after an illness of several years. Mr. Dan was born in London township 73 years ago, and had lived the last years at Brynston. He came to Victoria hospital several months ago for treatment.

He is survived by one brother, Edward, of this city.
The funeral will be held from the home of his brother, Mr. Dan, at 2:30 p.m. today at the Victoria hospital, London township.

ONE GOES TO HOSPITAL AFTER FRIENDLY ARGUMENT

HEAT-CRAZED BULL ATTACKS FARMER

William T. Moore Sustains Fractured Hip and Other Injuries.

Belmont, June 7.—When a heat-maddened bull attacked William T. Moore, he managed to grasp the ring in the nose of the animal, and to this he undoubtedly owes his life. He is now in Victoria hospital in London suffering from a fractured hip, and from injuries to his left side, where cartilages were torn from the ribs which pressed against the heart. The patient is reported tonight as resting easily and with every chance of early recovery.

The bull had been turned out to pasture in the orchard, and when Mr. Moore went to bring the animal in it made a dash at him, knocking him down. But for the fact that he was able to grasp the ring in the animal's nose he undoubtedly would have been gored to death. His son Frank hurried from the barn when he heard the father call for help, and had considerable difficulty in getting the animal back to the barn. The animal is not considered vicious, but owners have felt it must be watched at all times.

The man was brought to London in Outman's ambulance.

JUDGE SCORES LAXTY OF CITY OF WINDSOR

Sand Dumped On London Street Caused Serious Injury To Woman.

Toronto, June 6.—Having regard to the character of London street, Windsor, and its incessant traffic, Mr. Justice Lennox finds that it was an act of negligence for the city to dump sand upon it on a Saturday night. Lanterns had been placed on two piles of sand which obstructed the roadway, but they had burned out before 4 a.m. on March 29, when an automobile containing Mr. and Mrs. Wilson ran into the obstruction with disastrous results.

Mrs. Wilson suffered much pain and inconvenience. The judge remarks that the shock is likely to shorten her life. She is allowed \$900 damages, and Mr. Wilson gets his out-of-pocket expenses, \$416.

CHILD IS KILLED IN 25-FOOT FALL

Mary Robinson of Stratford Falls From Top of Water Tower.

Stratford, June 7.—Falling from what is believed must have been near the top of the 25-foot C. N. R. water tank, Shakespeare street, Mary, ten-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Robinson, 14 Milton street, met practically instant death at about 11:30 o'clock Saturday. The little girl was playing about the tank with two more youthful companions. The other children saw her fall and afraid and unable to give her assistance, left her and ran to her home, informing the parents of the mishap. No others witnessed the tragedy.

Dr. H. B. Kenner was called, but the little girl was beyond human aid. It is believed that internal injuries were severe, as externally she had suffered only two broken arms. She might have struck supports on the tank in the fall. The body was carried to the hospital.

There survive to mourn her loss, besides the parents, four brothers and two sisters.

RODNEY TELEPHONE HEAD ANSWERS CALL OF DEATH

FIRE FROM NEW AUTO DESTROYS PERTH BARN

Stratford, June 6.—Starting, it is believed, from defective ignition in a new car, fire completely destroyed the fine barn on the farm of Thomas Morris, of Harrington, last night. The building was valued at between \$3,000 and \$4,000. Beyond considerable machinery and some grain, five calves in the barn were cremated. The brilliance of the fire brought people from the countryside 20 miles around.
