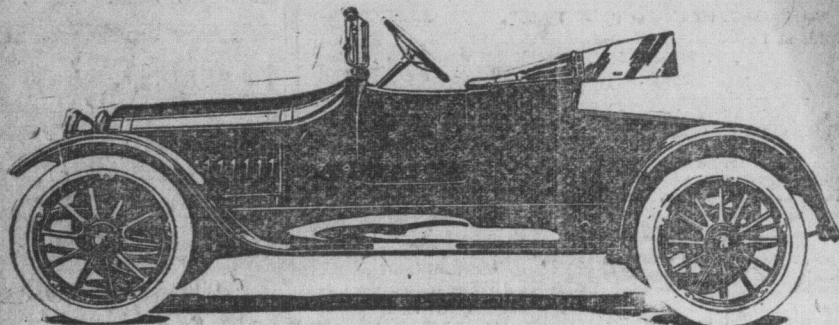

Laying Down Law For O.H.A. Games

Secretary Hewitt's Digest of Regulations in all the competitions

The O.H.A. Secretary has sent the following letter to club Secretaries: Each club is responsible for the eligibility of its players.

Birth Certificates for Juniors. The junior birth certificates must be official documents issued by the Registrar-General's department at the Parliament buildings, Toronto, or by a local registrar, or an extract from a church baptismal record certified to by the clergyman in charge.

with any team in the town in which they are located. So diars returned from overseas service may play wherever they locate.

Players living in rural districts, villages or police villages must play in the nearest O.H.A. town. A junior player however has the privilege of playing in the nearest town to his residence which has a junior O.H.A. team.

O.H.A. teams and players are debarred from playing with or against the Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Duluth, Amercan So., Houghton and St. Paul rink teams and Canadian teams who play against these teams.

Expenses of the travelling club are 10 cents per mile for one way for eight men which amount must be paid by the home club.

Official birth certificates filed last year for eligible junior players need not be renewed.

Any club refusing or failing to play the club against which it is matched debar itself from further competition. No ice of the result of each match much be sent to the association by the victorious club through the referee.

Referee's fee is \$5 in addition to an allowance at the rate of 10 cents a mile one way for all distances. The minimum fee and allowance is \$8 except in the case of a local referee.

After the group winners are returned the association appoints the referees. Each club is to pay half the referee's expenses.

Mustn't stop Half Way. In case of a club playing its home game and defaulting the return game the penalty will be the payment of a sum sufficient to completely cover the expenses of the visiting club in the first game such expenses to be hotel and bus bills for ten men and one-half the referee's expenses.

When clubs fail to agree upon a referee the home club must give the association seven days' notice of their refusal and an official will be sent otherwise that team will be ruled out of the competition. Clubs should agree on a referee wherever possible and save trouble for themselves and the association.

No Protests in Questions of Fact. Protests must be in duplicate and signed by the President or Secretary; must be filed with the association within 48 hours of the match protested and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25. Defending club has 36 hours to file a defence and must also deposit \$25. Service personally or by registered post will conform with the rule. Deep tests on questions of fact will not be entertained; as the referee's decision is final.

Why Was Jellicoe Made Peer?

BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN DIRECT SEQUEL OF LOSS OF THREE BRITISH

London, Dec. 29.—Whether cordly or not, the suppression of Admiral Sir John Jellicoe as first sea lord is popularly believed to have been the direct sequel of the loss of the three British destroyers near the Dutch coast. This incident has been generally known here, although only just announced officially.

Several days ago the first lord of the admiralty, Sir Eric Geddes, went to Sandringham, where the royal family is staying for the holidays. He was received in audience by the King on Christmas, which indicated that the business was unusually urgent. The admiral's changes were announced the next day.

TIME EXTENDED FOR VICTORY LOAN PAYMENTS

For the convenience of subscribers to the Victory Loan and of the banks handling the huge transaction, the Finance Department is to-day advising that payments due on January second may be made at any time up to and including January 11th. The extension of time is given in order that subscribers may not be unduly detained waiting their return in making their payments. It is partition

larly requested that shippers will not wait until January 11th day or so before, and this emergency situation sought to be averted.

THE WAR CHARITIES ACT, 1917. THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF CANADA.

The War Charities Act, 1917, defines "war charities" as follows: "any fund, institution or association other than a church or the Salvation Army, whether established before or after the commencement of the Act, having for its objects or one of its objects the relief of suffering, or distress, or the supplying of food or comforts to sufferers from the war, or to soldiers, returned soldiers, their families or dependents, or other charitable purposes connected with the present European war."

The Act also provides: (1) It shall not be lawful to make any appeal to the public for donations or subscriptions in money or kind for any war charity as herebefore defined, or to raise or attempt to raise money for any such charity by promoting any bazaar, sale, entertainment or exhibition by any similar means, unless—

- (a) the war charity is either exempted from registration or is registered under this Act; and (b) the approval in writing of the executive committee or other governing body of the war charity has been obtained either directly or through some person duly authorized to give such approval on behalf of such governing body and if any person contravenes any of the provisions of this section he shall be guilty of an offence against this Act.

(2) This section shall not apply to any collection at Divine Service in a place of public worship. The Act was assented to on the 29th of September, 1917, and the above section so far as it relates to registration is applicable to War Charities on the 20th of December, 1917. After that date, collections made otherwise than on behalf of a registered War Charity by subscriptions, donations, bazaars, sales, entertainments, exhibitions or similar means of collecting money are illegal.
