DOGS TO TRACE A SLAYER.

PARTICULARS OF THE MURDER IN THE RUE BOZARIS.

The Crime was Committed Either By a Surgeon or a Butcher—Bloodstains Were Found Three Hundred Yards From the Scene of the Butchery—The Police Active.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—A Paris correspondent gives the following additional particulars of the murder in the Rue Bozaris: It was evidently the work of a practised hand, the dissection of the body being skillfully performed, a fact which gives color to the belief that the work was done by a surgeon, or, at least, by a man who has been trained in the art of dissection. It is believed that not more than from 16 to 24 hours elapsed between when the crime was committed and the discovery of the body. It is also believed that the murderer remains were discovered. It is also believed that the body was still warm when it was found. There was a strong smell of carbolic acid in the room where the remains were found, and this fact at first led to the supposition that the body had been disinfected. It was intended as medical specimens, but evidence to the contrary was found in the fact that the body had been hacked and torn with a blunt knife. The police, after the discovery of the crime, were known for the only time to trace the murderer or murderers. Bloodstains found 300 yards distant in a waste area, and only one dog, named Madam Fallon, who lives near the scene, says her dog barked loudly Saturday morning, and on Sunday the saw two men pointing to the waste ground, one of them saying to the other: "That's the place." The remains were wrapped in a sheet and placed in a box temporarily, intending to take it elsewhere.
