In the summer of that year bad weather hamp ered operations, and many weeks had to be spent blasting a way to the gold store. Work was not resumed until the middle of the summer of 1919, when the wreck was again found. In the summer of 1920 great masses of wreckage and sand had obliterated the wreck, and various pumping schemes had to be adopted. In the following year the wreck was found to be broken up still further; the boilers had broken loose and were rolling about on the sea bottom, but
