Handsome Fruit Yield.

As an instance of the prolific yield of our fruit trees, where the advantages of soil and climate are supplemented by careful and well calculated, our attention is called to the productiveness of one or two apple trees in the orchard of Colonel Starratt, of Paradise.

One tree in particular which the Colonel showed us a photograph, with a sample of the beautiful fruit, is of the Golden Orange or Pippin variety, and harvested this year ten barrels of apples. It is a large tree of handsome form, well balanced and well laden with a delicious, high-colored fruit. The fruit was packed immediately on being taken from the tree by Mr. Bernard Spurr, of Paradise, whose long experience in apple packing has made him an expert in the business. Four barrels were put up as "extras," five as number ones and one as number two.

Of the extra, eighteen, nineteen, twenty and twenty-one apples placed the respective barrels, the bottom ends being also faced and pressed with a screw-press.

They were sold in London on the 7th inst., bringing 22 and 23 shillings per box, the tree realizing within a few cents of \$30.

He has also a Ribston Pippin tree standing 60 ft. from above mentioned Golden Orange which has brought him \$20 this year, the fruit being sold in London on Oct. 19th last. Also a King Tomkins tree at a distance of 110 ft. from first, giving him \$15 in London by same shipment; a total product of \$70 for the three trees, which must be very satisfactory when fruit is selling low as this year.
