—A committee has been formed at the Sarbonne for encouraging foreigners to study at the University of Paris. M. Pasteur is president. It is proposed to give special facilities to foreign students immediately upon their arrival in Paris.

TYPHOID FEVER.—A. Wiltschour of St. Petersburg, examined, in 28 cases, the stools of typhoid patients. He never found the specific bacilli earlier than the tenth day, after which date it was almost constantly present in the proportion of 1 to 25 or 30 of the other bacteria. Out of 35 cases where the blood was examined microscopically and by cultivation methods the characteristic bacillus was found once on the eighth day.

—During the past few years the subject of hygiene has received marked attention from the German Government. In nearly all the leading universities there are now hygienic institutes, thoroughly equipped in every way to afford to students excellent opportunities of acquiring a sound knowledge of this important subject. Last month the new Hygienic Institute in the University of Halle was opened by an address from Professor Benk. The Institute has a lecture-room which can accommodate sixty students, and also special chemical, physical and hacteriological laboratories. It is hoped that before long McGill University will possess a hygienic institute which will rival in completeness that of the German universities.

—J. B.
