SALES TAX ON MARGARINE IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Question No. 2,712—Mr. Laprise:

Is federal sales tax applied to sales of margarine in the province of Newfoundland and, if not, since when and for what reason?

Hon. E. J. Benson (Minister of National Revenue and President of the Treasury Board): To fulfil an undertaking of the government to the Newfoundland delegation during the negotiations leading to confederation, sales of margarine in the province of Newfoundland were not subjected to federal sales tax from the date of confederation. During the period April 1, 1949, to March 30, 1966, annual remission orders gave effect to this undertaking; however, effective March 30, 1966, the exemption was established under an act to amend the Excise Tax Act (Bill C198 which received royal assent July 11, 1966).
