PROPOSED TRANS-ALASKA PIPELINE SYSTEM—EXPRESSION OF CANADIAN OPPOSITION—PARTICIPATION BY BRITISH COLUMBIA IN MEETING WITH UNITED STATES OFFICIALS

Mr. Heath Macquarrie (Hillsborough): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct a question to the Minister of Transport who I see is on the roster today. It is prompted by the information given the Leader of the Opposition in Alaska yesterday by Professor Weedon indicating the paucity of research concerning possible effects of coastal and water pollution from the TAPS route. Is the minister in a position to assure the people of Canada that the government of Canada will present to the United States government its strong opposition to the TAPS project which threatens the Canadian people with an ecolocatastrophe?

Considering the fact that the British Columbia government, in contradiction to his own government, has a strong and clear-cut position on the matter, will negotiations be entered into with the United States so that the government of British Columbia might be invited to the May 3 conference?
