Table conference dealing with matters peculiarly relating to the British Commonwealth. After some discussion, the Secretary was instructed to write to the Royal Institute, intimating that the Executive Council of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs had unanimously expressed their approval of the subject advanced at the conference in 1929, that arrangements should be made for holding Round Table discussions on the conduct of foreign affairs by and within the British Commonwealth; that they felt Great Britain and the self-governing dominions should be represented; that it would be held, if possible, in 1932; that the group should consist of five or six representatives from each country, representing the widest possible variety of views; that the place of meeting be decided after the Royal Institute had ascertained the views of the representatives of the various countries on that point; and that the foregoing be communicated to the Royal Institute of International Iffairs with the suggestion that they take the initiative in arranging such a discussion.

The meeting then adjourned.
