so great a length of time kept up an intimate and constant intercourse.

He observed also, as an additional inducement, that Captain Parry, in his authentic and official account of the expedition, had not deemed it fit or necessary to enter into many of those minute and peculiar traits which are requisite for displaying the character of a strange people. Captain Parry's opinion on this subject agreeing with Mr. Barrow's, I could no longer hesitate; and therefore, after a few abbreviations, and the omission of some details of natural history, and of scientific observations, I sent the original manuscript to the printer. This is the brief history of my private gossiping journal, thus making its appearance before the Public, on whose kindness and indulgence I now beg to throw myself.
