

HOW CIVIC GRANT WILL BE EXPENDED

W. J. Gage Explains Plans of National Sanitarium Association.

TO INCREASE SALARIES

Mayor Thinks Police Should Get Raise as Well as Firemen.

Just how the \$200,000 voted by the National Sanitarium Association by the city is to be expended was explained to the Board of Control by W. J. Gage, who was accompanied by a number of the executive of the association.

For a new wing to the Toronto Free Hospital \$30,000 will be expended. This wing will accommodate patients requiring constant nursing and those waiting for admission.

Care of Vagrants. This expenditure of the \$200,000 was approved by the board of control. Controller McCarthy introduced the problem of the care of vagrants affected with tuberculosis, and insisted that it should be disposed of.
