## MORE ARITHMETIC THAN NECESSARY

Inspector Rogers Opines That Accuracy Drills Are Unduly Emphasized.

### CLASS FOR DEFECTIVES

Will Be Disbanded, as It Is Doing Very Little Good.

Clamor for incessant drilling of pupils in working out large arithmetical problems by Toronto's business men has caused undue stress placed upon this phase of education by the teachers more than is necessary to teach children the methods of solving such problems. This is the opinion given in a report yesterday by Inspector Rogers to the board of education's management committee.

Times without number people in business have said the city schools failed to teach pupils accuracy in simple arithmetic. To overcome this teachers have drilled children for accuracy long after the method itself has been mastered. Mr. Rogers' report contained this as an opinion. The report made it to be investigated the complaint of M. J. Moore that his daughter Ethel, aged 9, had been given too much home work by Miss Sloan, teacher at Queen Victoria school. The report found that as a rule Miss Sloan does not give too much home work; that she had been harmed by the complaint, and that a little more fact by the principal would have obviated the whole trouble. Trustee Shaw said a wrong impression had gone abroad that too much home work was given in Toronto.

**Nine in Defective Class.**  
It is likely the much-mooted class for mentally defective, so popular one year ago, will be disbanded. The inspectors reported against it, saying there were but nine in the class, and that a comprehensive system was in use. The British Imperial Association in Toronto wanted investigation of a charge of cruelty to a pupil by a teacher in the school there. This the inspectors will do. Dr. Embree's recommendation for abolition of entrance examinations and issuance of a certificate by the principal and inspector was approved and sent on. Provision of almost 300,000 Ontario Safety League publicity blotters in the schools was approved. It was recommended that no collections for charity be allowed to be taken in the schools except by the Sick Children's Hospital, the East End Day Nursery and the Children's Aid Society.

## GREY SATISFIED TO AWAIT NEWS

U.S. Doing All Possible to Discover Facts of Benton's Death.

LONDON, Feb. 26.—Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, informed the house of commons today of Secretary of State Bryan's proposal to send an American army surgeon and another responsible American, with Consul Percival of Galveston, to conduct the examination of the body of man killed by Villa at Juarez. The foreign secretary continued:

"We are satisfied that the government of the United States has shown as much interest in this case and as if Benton had been an American citizen. We cannot ourselves do more at the present moment than send a consular officer to be present at whatever investigation may be made."

Sir Edward Grey added: "I will make a considered statement to the house of commons next week of the view of the British Government as to what can be done further, either to get the truth if it is then in doubt or to secure what justice may require."

**SIR JOHN TENNIEL DEAD WAS NOTED CARTOONIST**  
LONDON, Feb. 26.—Sir John Tenniel, for many years the leading British cartoonist, died today, at the age of 84.

Sir John was a Londoner born and bred, a self-taught artist, and made his first mark as long ago as 1845, by winning a prize in the Westminster Hall cartoon competition. He joined the staff of the London Punch in 1851 and remained there until his death. He was not very many years ago that the newspapers of many countries thought worth while noting that an issue of Punch had just appeared without a cartoon by him—a remarkable tribute. Tenniel's style was severely classical.

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## BELIEVE BRITANNIC IS PRACTICALLY UNSINKABLE

BELFAST, Ireland, Feb. 25.—The launching today of the Britannic, the 50,000-ton White Star liner, marks an important development in construction, so far as engineering ingenuity can ensure it.

The Britannic, intended for the transatlantic service, had only just been laid down when the Titanic disaster occurred, and as a result of the accident, the plans of the new liner were almost completely remodelled, which accounts for her long stay on the stocks. She is a triple screw steamer, 300 feet in length and there has been introduced into her construction every device possible to prevent a recurrence of disaster which overtook the Titanic. A complete inner skin extends to a considerable height above the load line, the most vulnerable portion of the vessel, and the height and number of bulkheads has been increased.

It is claimed for the Britannic that she will be able to float with any six compartments flooded. The inner skin consists of heavy plates.

**"POOL" RENEWED FOR FIVE YEARS.**  
HAMBURG, Germany, Feb. 26.—The continental shipping pool in which the Hamburg-American and North German-Lloyd lines are the principal parties concerned, was renewed today for a period of five years. All the questions in dispute between the companies engaged in the transatlantic trade having been settled.

**UNITED STATES APPLIES TEST TO ONTARIO CATTLE**
