MADAM CORDAY FOND OF CANADA

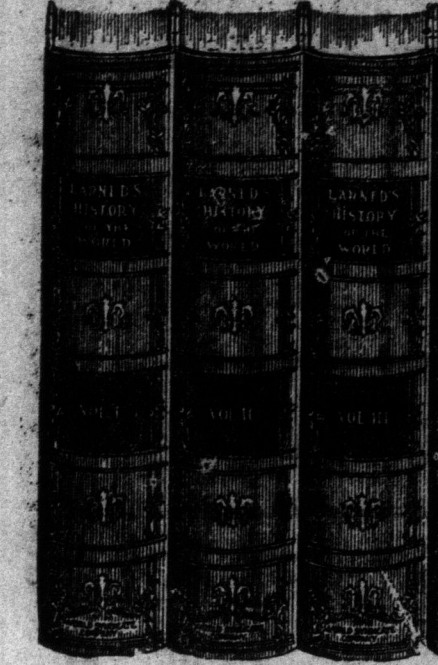
Glad to Return to Toronto Where She Has Appeared Before.

ASK WOMAN TEACHER FOR MERGER SCHOOL

Local Council of Women Request Government Support for Permanent Instructor.

Once again the women proceeding in strength to Queen's Park, missed an opportunity with cabinet minister. This time Hon. W. J. Hanna was unaware of their coming and was dejected. The women proceeded to the minister's office and presented a petition for government support of a permanent teacher in the Mercer Reformatory.

The Toronto Local Council of Women led by Mrs. A. M. Huestis and Hamilton Cates K.C. pointed out that at the present time a teacher is maintained for about one week each by the courtesy of the prisoners' aid society. The institution, however, was not a school, and the women's education was kept inside the confines of the city, education remained in the hands of the women's aid society. The government will grant constant attention to the request.

RESTRAIN COMPANIES FROM USING STOCK

MAKE MANY SHIRTS AND PROVIDE WORK

Edatons Have Contributed Orders Which Will Keep Factories Going a Month.

To make 1200 work shirts in a modern factory would occupy the time and machines of about 150 operators for one day. The T. Eaton Co. have contributed orders to Canadian shirt factories sufficient to keep over 100 shirt makers busy for 30 days. These shirts are largely workmen's shirts the all sorts are included in the total contribution.

The idea is to sell these shirts to workmen and others at cost of production and distribution. The object primarily was to provide extra employment at the shirt factories, and the Eaton Co. offers to sell the goods so produced without profit, if the manufacturers would do the same. The object was to give extra employment to 40,000 men a special reason for buying shirts.
