Annual Statement of Railway Employes' Union Tells of Benefits Paid Members.

According to the annual statement, issued yesterday by Secretary W. D. Robbins of the Toronto St. Railway Employes Union, during the Year of 1914, the union paid to its members \$9087.81 in sick and death benefits. \$4123.81 for medical assistance and \$3600 in death claims. Eleven members died during the year and their families received the usual payments, which are graduated according to length of membership.

There are now 2184 paid-up members in the Toronto local, which places it at the head of local unions in Canada with regard to numerical strength.

Twenty-six members are now fighting on the British line, and several of them were reservists of crack English and Scotch regiments.

STREET RAILWAY NOT LIABLE FOR ACCIDENT

Mrs. Mary Wainburgh lost her action against the Toronto Street Railway Co., from whom she claimed \$500 damages for personal injuries received by heing thrown from a College street car at the corner of Yonge and Gerrard on Oct. 4, 1913.

The jury found that there was no negligence on the part of the Street Railway Co., and the action was dismissed with costs.


