LEHIGH VALLEY IN LINE.

New York, Sept. 15.—It was announced to-day that to take effect on Nov. 1 or a ssoon thereafter as possible, the maximum rate per mile on the Lehigh Valley Railroad system will be on the basis of 21-2 cents.
