FAULKNER'S SIDE OF THE STORY.

There appears to be some misunderstanding regarding Queen-street Entrance to High Park. The World saw Mr. George Faulkner on Saturday evening when he made the following statement in reference to his entrance with the proposed entrance into High Park from Queen-street.

During Mr. Jennings' regime as City Engineer a proposal was formed by him to extend Queen-street into High Park. The proposed roadway was to run alongside the present Grand Trunk Railway tracks. I offered to dedicate a strip of land alongside the tracks for the purpose, Mrs. McDowell, the owner of the land to the east of this point, objected to the plan of the roadway, and said she would claim heavy damages from the city if the scheme went on.

When Mr. Fleming was appointed Assessment Commissioner, he undertook to settle the matter. He consulted with Mrs. McDowell, and fell in with her views as to how the roadway should be laid out. He advised that Mrs. McDowell did not wish the roadway necessitating the removal of her house and giving her two frontages on the street.

I called on this statement of Mr. Fleming, and agreed to dedicate my land on two conditions. One of these conditions was that the road should be freed from local taxation for a period of ten years along the proposed street, and that the scheme should go through. A draft agreement was prepared and presented to me for signature. I signed the agreement, and the following draft agreement: There was no clause binding the city to exempt my property from local taxation. There was a clause, however, binding me to give my land where the city acquired the lands of the orphanage or of the Sunnyside Orphanage, was a clause which I would sign.
