CALLS THEATRES DEATH TRAPS.

Architect Makes Stirring Appeal for Reform in Construction, Berlin, Dec. 12.-Frederick Hood of the Society of German Architects has made a stirring appeal for the reform of theatre construction. He asserts that "gallery gods" and most of the actors in Germany are in nightly danger of suffocation on ac count of the criminal absence of bygieniqualities in the playhouses of the emptre He also states that, in addition to the im pure atmosphere, the theatres are veritable firetraps, the majority being unprovided with the most elementary precautions, such as adequate exits and aisle facilities.

"The art of ventilation," says Mr. Hood, "was unknown to builders twenty years ago, and is still neglected by German theatre architects. The introduction of the electric light was a great advance, but the police regulations require electricity only in theatres holding more than 800 persons. In the houses especially patronized by the masses no attempt whatever is made to combat the most fundamental evils, such as draughts. Their stuffy galleries resemble the 'black hole of Calcutta.'

"Behind the scenes and below the stage the very worst conditions prevail. Dampness, dust, extreme heat, cold, foul odors mingle with microbe-infested 'properties.' The dreesing-rooms are invariably strangers to sunlight and fresh air. When the actors have gained the stage the reeking vapors from the lower regions ascend to their nostrils thru the trap doors and cracket floors.


