LOCAL MARKET.

London, Tuesday, Sept. 10.

The market today was hardly up to the
average. During the fair week the mar-
kets are smaller than at any other time
of the year, and today's market was no
exception to the rule. Although the rain
fell during the continuance of the market,
sales were not at all slow, a considerable
amount of business being transacted in a
short space of time. There was hardly
any change in prices.

Grain—There was a good demand for the
small supply of oats, sales were made at
\$1.35 per bushel for new and \$1.48 for old.
Hay and Straw—About a dozen loads of
hay were marketed; owing to the rain
sales were a trifle slow, from \$14 to \$15
per ton being paid; nearly all sold at
\$14.50 per ton. Straw sold at \$6.50 per
ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was none too
plentiful, and sold at 22c for crocks and
23c for pound rolls. Eggs were scarce at
17c to 18c per dozen.

Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes were
dull of sale, there being too large a quan-
tity on the market; sales were made at
75c to 80c per bushel, and 90c to \$1 per bushel;
the latter price for the early St. John
variety; cabbages, 12c to 15c each;
dressed hogs—Prices were steady, at
\$6.50 to \$9 per cwt.

There were no changes in the prices of
poultry or butchers' meats.

Dewar's dogs and cats, Madame O'Neil's
Berzac's Circus, Winchellmann's Bears,
Kelly, Reno and Picaro, Reno and
Smith and Marriot twins. They fur-
nish good entertainment. The crowd
yesterday enjoyed their work very
much.

Knabenshue's airship did not go up
yesterday owing to the fact that a
strong wind was blowing. He expects
to be able to make the ascension to-
day. The crowd was disappointed at
the failure of the balloon to go up yester-
day, but if it fails to go up today
this attraction will be cut out.

The Racings.

Only one race event was pulled off
yesterday—that for slow trotters and
pacers. It was decided in straight
heats, Berlin Belle, a tidy-going pacer
taking it in three heats. Campbell's
pacer, Perfection, was bang-up all the
way, and looks good for better things.
McCartney's Belle Mac took third
money. Miss Kate Wilks, Galt, has
some fine horses at the grounds. She
started Mary Vincent yesterday, but
was not up to the money.

today many prize winners will be
shown.

The Live Stock.

The live stock department of the
Western Fair for 1907 still sustains its
record as being the best live stock in

the province. In every department the
buildings are filled to overflowing.
There is a very large entry and qual-
ity is not lacking. In many cases ex-
ceedingly fine specimens are to be seen.

The horses this year have eclipsed
all previous years. There are nearly
100 more entries than there were
last year. The overflow had to be accom-
modated in one end of the cattle sheds.
Monday, in this department was most-
ly taken up putting on the finishing
touches to be in readiness for the
judges, Tuesday morning.

Cattle.

In this department are to be seen
the finest that can be produced by
careful breeding. No doubt during the
week the cattle sheds will be the
center of attraction for the farmer,
where he can see all the different
breeds in one building and compare
one with the other.

As the fair advances The Advertiser
will specialize on the different breeds
in all the departments. The attend-
ants this morning were all very busy
washing and combing each animal, so
that they will look their best when
taken before the judge.

Sheep.

The sheep, as in former years, are
a fine exhibit, of which more will be
said later on.

Swine.

Although not so many in numbers
as in some former years, the quality is
equal to anything yet exhibited at the
Western. Yorkshires are a fine class,
and some very excellent animals are
to be seen. Berkshires and Tamworths
also are a fine exhibit. The Hamp-
shires, a new breed, exhibited by Ar-
temas O'Neill, of Birr, is well worthy of
special mention. This, from appear-
ances will be the coming hog. They
are from Hampshire, England, grow to
a good size, and still retain a very
fine, even shape, and no doubt will
take well amongst the hog raisers of
Western Ontario.

Mr. O'Neill certainly deserves great
credit for introducing this fine breed,
which only needs to be seen to be ap-
preciated.

Poultry.

In this department is where excite-
ment prevails. The poultry exhibit of
1907 is the best display of poultry
(with the exception of the Guelph Win-
ter Fair) ever gotten together in the
Dominion. The Fair Board enlarged
the building considerably this year,
adding 40 feet, and still there is hard-
ly an empty coop. As Monday was
the opening day in this department
everything was hustle and bustle up
till 2 o'clock getting the birds in the
different sections in their places.

Ald. John H. Saunders, superintend-
ent, had his hands full getting every-
thing in readiness for the judges to
commence at 2 o'clock.

He was ably assisted by W. S. G.
Saunders and Mr. McLeod.

Quite a number of new exhibitors
are to be seen placing their tickets,
and no doubt will be heard from later,
when the judges have placed the
awards. Owing to the late arrival of
some of the exhibitors, the judges did
not get through, and have to finish
Tuesday morning. The entries are
something like 250 over last year, the
total being something over 1,700. The
building is now considered the best
in the Province. The judges are Mr.
Jarvis, of Montreal; Mr. Butterfield,
of Windsor, and Mr. Oke and Mr. Mc-
Neill, of London.

**A Party of Young People
Drown at Saginaw, Mich.****Can of Gasoline Explodes and
Their Launch Burns—
Five Escape.**

Saginaw, Mich., Sept. 10.—August
Heid Roland Kemp Blanche Pototski
and Anna Farmer, ages between 20
and 25, were drowned in Saginaw
River about 9 o'clock Sunday night,
when flames from an exploding gaso-
line can set fire to a launch causing
them to jump overboard. The victims
are all children of well known Saginaw
citizens.

Up to 11 o'clock none of the bodies
had been recovered, although a big
force was dragging the river. The ac-
cident occurred near the Pere Mar-
quette bridge.

There were others than those drown-
ed in the launch and they tell a thril-
ling story of the accident, of their
companions' frantic efforts for life
and of their own miraculous escape.

**Disastrous Results Attend
Auto Races at Pittsburgh****One Man Killed; Three Others
Injured—Tire Comes Off
a Car.**

Pittsburgh, Sept. 10.—One man dead
and three others more or less seriously
injured were results of two accidents
at a series of automobile races that
were held at the Bruno's Island track
near this city yesterday.
