The subject of this sketch was born near London, Ont., Feb. 14, 1860. He lived on a farm until about 18 years of age, when he started his apprenticeship on the Exeter (Ont.) Reflector, on which paper he worked three years, afterward working in Collingwood and Galt, Ont. In 1882 he moved to London, and there got his first insight into unionism, becoming a member of No. 133 in 1883. Mr. Hodgins remained in that city until May, 1876, and in the in that city until May, 1856, and in the meantime worked in the various offices in that city. In 1886 he moved to Bay City, Mich., where he has since resided, with the exception of six months, when he worked in Detroit and Saginaw, Mich. He has been financial secretary and corresponding secretary of No. 81 at various time for the past ten years. At the meeting in July to elect a delegate to the International Typographical Union convention to be held in Syracuse, he was chosen as a representative to that body. Mr. Hodgins also holds membership in the Masons, K. of P., D. O. K. K., I. O. O. F. and M. W. A. In 1893 Mr. Hodgins represented No. 81 at the convention of the State Federation of Labor, and brought back a very fine report of the proceedings.
