# U. S. DESTROYERS IN BRUSH WITH SUB

Flotilla Which Crossed Atlantic Quickly Gets Into Action.

QUEENSTOWN, May 16.—A squadron of America torpedoboat destroyers has safely crossed the Atlantic and is patrolling the seas in war service.

The American navy's actual entry into the war zone has already been productive of a brush between a destroyer and a German underwater boat, according to an announcement by the British admiralty, but the result of it has not been made public.

The destroyer squadron arrived in Queenstown after an uneventful voyage across the Atlantic, but also immediately after a formal exchange of greetings with the British naval officers put to sea again for the hard work that is before it.

The commander of the British flotilia was waiting on board his ship and sent wireless greetings to the American units as soon as they have in sight of Queerstown, steaming in a long line into the harbor.

After the exchange of shore greetings and the British commander had congratulated the American officers on their safe voyage, he asked:

"When will you be ready for business?"

"We can start at once," the American commander replied promptly.

PTE. JOHN ERNEST EMMOTT, of Chatham, who died on April 14 in No. 18 Clearing Station, France, from wounds received at Vimy Ridge on April 9, his 21st birthday.

Pte. Emmott enlisted in London with the 33rd Battalion and went overseas with a detached company of that unit. He served fourteen months in the trenches and fought at Ypres and at the Somme, where he received his first wounds. At Vimy Ridge he was a company bomber.

The youngest son of Mrs. J. E. Emmott, his only other immediate relatives are his brothers, Pte. Walter Emmott of the 186th (Kent) Battalion, now in Kent, England, and Joseph Emmott of the Chatham Planet, who has been three times rejected from military service. The equipment on board the destroyers was found on inspection by the British commander to be in excellent condition and remarkably well suited to the requirements on this side of the ocean. In fact, it was said by the British officer that the only thing lacking in the equipment of the American sailors was heavier clothing. It appears that the Americans were wearing clothing too light for the varying conditions of weather they will encounter in these waters. This lack, however, was quickly provided for.

One of the American destroyers began war duty even before reaching this side of the Atlantic. This was when it picked up and escorted through the danger zone one of the largest of the Atlantic liners. This action so pleased the British passengers on board that they sent a message of greeting and appreciation to the commander of the destroyer.


