The penalty provisions against newspapers were attacked by the Hon. Frank Oliver. He stated that newspapers involved large investments and the value depended upon continuous publication. The suppression of a book merely destroyed the investment in an issue, the suppression of a newspaper destroyed a business. He offered an amendment providing that suppression in the case of a newspaper should be limited to the single issue in which the offence was committed, and that action had to be taken by indictment before a judge. OTTAWE, July 17.—The military service bill has taken another step forward. Tonight it received its final gouch in committee, and was reported. The scrutiny that has been given the measure in committee had been long and careful. It emerges with the principle intact, but with the details considerably altered.

There has been a reclassification of the men liable for conscription; there was added to the bill most drastic and stringent provisions against interference with its enforcement. The reclassification puts the first six classes into two classes; single men and widowers without children to be called first.

A clause exempting divinity students

A clause exempting divinity students was put in by way of amendment, and taken out by way of further amendment.

Now the measure stands for third reading, and then goes to the Senate for enactment by that chamber.

It will reach the Senate on Wednesday next, and the centre of interest will be transferred from the green to the red chamber. There is expected to be no great difficulty in getting the measure through the Senate. The Government now has a majority there, and vacancies enough to increase that majority by further appointments. As in the Commons, it is expected that a number of the English-speaking members of the Upper House will vote with the Governent for the bill.

The vote of French Government members of the Senate against the bill is expected to be limited to two. The debate in the Senate is not likely to last as long as in the Commons. The measure has been much discussed already; there is little that can be said further, and it is not the practice of the Senate to struggle with a measure with the bitterness of the Commons.

Canada will soon have conscription as a part of the law of the land.

Condition Needs Fixing.

Capt. Burnham informed the House that many gallant officers of Canada, who were over age, had succeeded in getting to the front and doing fine service. There were others equally willing who had not been able to get to the front, and there were some, not over age, and of military age, who neither desired nor endeavored to go to the front, but preferred to remain and hold down jobs. Capt. Burnham declared it a scandal that they should be allowed to do so. They were blocking the advancement of worthy men who could not rise past them. There were many cases where men who had seen service, who had suffered wounds, and who had efficiency, and were entitled to be brought back and given positions held by men less worthy. This condition exasperated young men in the service, and the Government should take steps to correct the condition.
