

BABE RUTH MAKING A STRONG BID FOR HOME RUN RECORD

Ty Cobb Has Not Yet Recovered His Batting Eye.

Chicago, May 15.—"Babe" Ruth's 1926 offensive towards a new home-run record is in full bloom. The New York slugger connected with a trio of home runs in two days, and has five circuit drives to his credit, according to averages compiled today. The averages include games of Wednesday. Johnston of Cleveland shot to the front among the American League batters, with an average of .414, acquired in 20 games. The Cleveland first baseman connected with 29 hits, with a total of 55 bases. Joe Jackson of Chicago is right behind Johnston with a mark of .397, compiled in the same number of games. Jackson, however, made 31 hits for a total of 49 bases, being at bat 78 times to his rival's 70.

Bobby Roth of Washington is showing the way to the base stealers with nine thefts. Ty Cobb has not yet fully recovered his batting eye. In 21 games with Detroit the star has made only 18 hits for an average of .343. Other leading batters are: Kinney, Philadelphia .381; Weaver, Chicago .376; Felsch, Chicago .362.

Outfielder Nicholson of Pittsburgh has taken the lead among the National League batters. He is hitting .455 for 12 games, with Roger Hornsby, the St. Louis star, the runner-up, with .414, one point in front of LeBourveau of Philadelphia. The averages include players who have participated in ten or more games.

Max Flack, Chicago's lead-off man, is the leading run-getter. He has registered 17 times, and has been on base an average of twice a game, but the members following him have not been able to deliver the necessary punch to put him across the plate with anything like consistency.

Williams of Philadelphia and Robertson of Chicago are tied for home-run honors. Each has whacked out three round trips.

Roush of Cincinnati, who has recovered his batting eye, and is up among the leaders this week, is in a triple tie for stolen base honors, with his teammate, Neale, and Stock of St. Louis. Each has pilfered five bases. Other leading batmen:

Big Score Board Will Announce the Results of Big Track Meet

Novel Method in Use at Big Athletic Meets in Britain To Be Tried Out Here—Entries Coming Fast.

At the first inter-collegiate athletic meeting, to be held at Queen's Park on the holiday, a novel system of scoring will be introduced, which, from the spectator's standpoint, leaves nothing to be desired. The scheme is copied from that used at the British championships in England, the oldest athletic organization in the world, and consists of a score board 12 feet by 6, mounted on a swivel base, on which the results of each of the 25 events will be posted before the public immediately the race is run. Thus the spectators can record each race on their programs, and the straining of ears to catch the garbled words of the announcers will be eliminated.

Admission tickets, track numbers and final instructions to the competitors are being dispatched from Secretary Brock's office as fast as the certified entries are received, and the committee has made preparations for handling 350 athletes. Each mail brings in fresh entries, but the large schools are taking every day they can. The track will be posted before the public immediately the race is run. Thus the work will see it in grand shape.
