Oriando, Fla., Nov. 3.—A negro named Perry, who shot and killed two men at Ocose after he had been refused a vote, was lynched early today outside the corporate limits of Oriando. He was hanged to a tree and his body riddled with builets.

Election officials say Perry was refused a vote because he had not paid his poll tax. He returned to the voting place last night with a shotgun, and opened fire on the white men, killing two, one a war veteran, and wounding several others, not seriously. Perry was arrested and later taken from the officers by a mob.

PROHIBITION PLAN AS APPROVED IN B. C., IS **FULL OF LOOPHOLES**

Provincial Government Finds Itself Powerless To Act.

NEEDS FEDERAL AID

Dominion Parliament Alone Can Sanction Forbidding of Importation.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Nov. 3.-According to ficial opinion here the province British Columbia is in a somewhat interesting tangle with regard to its recent liquor referendum. The result of that referendum which was purely provincial and not federal in character, was to substitute for the existing provincial act, Government control of the sale of intoxicating liquors, it is now for the Government of the province to introduce legislation implementing the people's will.

DECIME MODE Sebastopol, Nov. 8.—Four Soviet Sebastopol, Nov. 3.—Four Soviet armies, with squadrons of cavalry, are pushing southward from Melitopot of the railway to Alexandrovsk, some fifty miles north of the Crimean Peninsula, in an attempt to cut off the forces of Gen. Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik commander, in retreat before the Soviet offensive. Some of the Wrangel troops are being removed by transports on the Sea of Azov from Tauride Province into the Crimea.

Copenhagen, Nov. 3.—Polish "volunteer" forces commanded by Gen. Bulak Balakovitch, have occupied the city of Minsk, which was reported on October 18 to have been taken over by the Bolsheviki from the Poles, according to newspaper dispatches. It is said these troops which have been reported operating in the rear of the Bolshevik lines for the past two weeks, are seriously threatening Smolensk, a city on the Dnieper River, about 250 miles northwest of Moscow, and it is asserted they plan an advance against the soviet capital. capital.
