REPUBLICANS SWEEP DEMOCRATS FROM POWER; HARDING IS NEW PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES

Greatest Republican Pluralities Ever Recorded in Party History.

WOMEN'S VOTE A FACTOR Southern States Turned to Harding on League Issue.

New York, Nov. 3.—One of the most sweeping Republican victories in party history today stood recorded for Senator Warren G. Harding for president and a Republican Congress. Tremendous and unparalleled Republican pluralities beginning with the first count of ballots in yesterday's election, continued mounting today.

RAILWAYS COSTLY TO U. S. GOVT.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 3.—Private operation of the United States railways for the first six months after the end of federal control will cost the Federal Government a total of \$68,000,000, according to figures made public today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.
