Willows, chairman of the racing board of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association, hands out the following information for the benefit of intending competitors in the trials for the Olympia team regarding the distances of races to be ridden at the Olympic games, which, with one exception, are different from the distances which are always ridden here: 585 metres (640 yards). 5000 metres (5468 yards), 100 kilometres (522 miles), 1000 inetres (1093.6 yards), 20 kilometres (12.4 miles), pursuit race, 1 mile, and tandem race 2000 metres (1.24 miles).

It would be well for those who intend taking part in the trial races (dates will be announced later), to train for the above distances and familiarize themselves with conditions generally which they will have to contend with should they be chosen for the team.

A Fudge Recipe.

Melt a level teaspoonful of butter in a porcelain lined saucepan; add a coffeecupful of granulated sugar, one-third of a cupful of sweet milk and a pinch of salt. Bring to a boiling point, stirring constantly; cook about eight minutes from the time it begins to boil. Test in the usual manner until a spoonful dropped in ice water will form a soft ball. Add desired flavoring when the mixture is taken from the stove. Beat at least ten minutes after it is done, by which time it should form a creatny imass and should be poured into a large square pan, well greased. When almost cold, cut in squares; the squares may be dipped in checolate if liked. Ground nuts added
