

"FLU" ON WANE, SAY AUTHORITIES

Reports Coming in Indicate
Decided Drop in Mor-
tality List.

There is now no doubt in the minds of public health officials that the two widespread infections—flu and pneumonia—are rapidly on the wane, and growing weaker daily. Forty-four deaths have occurred in Toronto during the last 24 hours. Of these 13 were attributable to influenza, six to pneumonia, and the rest to other causes. This is practically a record for low mortality since the outbreak of the two dread diseases.

The Red Cross Emergency Branch at the city hall reports cheering progress, also tempering their encouraging statements by saying that the situation is still acute as regards the dearth of volunteer workers. While the number of cases under the city's direct surveillance has dropped away down to 578, yet 143 new families have been added to this list within the last few days. "There were 18 cases we were not able to send assistance to," said Miss Bickle, who is in charge of the relief work, "and we only had one woman register for service. The people seem to think that the epidemic is all over. It may be true that there are not so many cases, but many that are left are very serious ones."

Dr. Hastings stated that he agreed with the members of the American Congress of Internal Medicine, who met in Chicago, that there is little likelihood of this continent again being visited with epidemics of influenza and pneumonia, similar to this year and last.

Four policemen at No. 4 station, Constables Waghorne, Britton, Baker and Evans, have been stricken with small-pox.

The fact that nurses of the department of health use No. 4 station as their district headquarters is thought by some of the police officials to have something to do with the constables' illness.

Dr. Hastings, however, scouted the idea, stating that one of the constables had probably carried the disease and infected the others.

POSED AS INSPECTOR; NEARLY KILLED WOMAN

Mrs. Elsie Markle, Kingscourt Apartments, was badly beaten about the head and almost choked to death by a man who entered her apartment under pretence of being a telephone inspector. The man, who is still being sought by the police, was seen running around the place, and opening the door of the Markle apartment on the third floor, he told Mrs. Markle he came to repair the telephone. He then seized the woman by the throat, and after mauling her, struck her over the head with a blunt instrument. The cries of the woman attracted the attention of others living in the building, and taking flight, the man fled. Mrs. Markle collapsed on the floor, and is suffering from injuries and shock.

Mrs. Markle described her assailant to the police as being a tall, well-dressed man, and said he was in his shirt sleeves when he entered her home.

Detectives and plainclothesmen have been detailed to the case.

CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS.

John Conick, 237 Simcoe street, was injured about the head yesterday when a plank fell on him while he was working in the basement of the Cato building, Yonge and Shuter streets. He was taken to St. Michael's Hospital.

When he slipped and fell on the rails in the G.T.R. yards, Simcoe street, yesterday, John Wood, 1173 Dovercourt road, was injured about the ribs. He was admitted to Grace Hospital.

NEWS OF LABOR

BUILDING TRADES RESTIVE IN QUEBEC

Possibility of a General Strike—
International and Catholic
Unions Clash.

CONSULT WASHINGTON

Montreal, Feb. 24.—Possibilities of a general strike in the building trades throughout the province of Quebec are looming up as a result of a clash which has come to a head between the international and national Catholic unions in the industry. The two organizations are diametrically opposed in ideal and purpose, both sides are now engaged in preparations for a struggle which must result in the obliteration of one of the groups, and which may result in a general upheaval of the building industry which would be disastrous at the present time, when a building boom is early expected. Both unions are holding meetings in the city at the present time and are organizing a fight for supremacy.

Fear Serious Clash

John W. Bruce, general organizer of the International Plumbers and Steamfitters' Union, and chairman of the international conference board now sitting in the city, stated: "There appears to be an effort on the part of the National Catholic Union to make a fight against the international unions. A serious clash is inevitable unless steps are taken to overcome it."

In view of the seriousness of the local situation the international conference board is sending officers to Washington to lay the full facts of the case before the international president of the building trades unions there.

BREAD DRIVERS PROGRESSING.

Crystal Foxhall has been appointed business manager for the Bread Drivers' Union. The union unanimously decided upon this appointment at a largely attended meeting held at S. O. E. Hall on Monday night. The union initiated no less than 64 new members. It was decided to draw up a new wage schedule, to be presented at the next meeting of the union. It is noteworthy that the new agreement falls due on May 1, the date upon which that of the bakers falls due.

HAD NO CONFERENCE.

James T. Ginn last night denied the report to the effect that he had been in conference with Dr. W. A. Riddell, deputy minister of labor, relative to the standardization of wages. He stated that he had made investigations in the matter and had found that 60 per cent. of the women in the province were receiving \$12 or less a week. He said that the 40 per cent. minimum possible for women was \$16 a week.

TO ATTEND CONVENTION

James Marsh, the veteran trade unionist of Niagara Falls; Harry Kirwin, president of the Marine Tenders' Federation; Harry Harper, general organizer for the International Association of Machinists in Canada; John Munro, president of Toronto Trades Council and business manager for the International Association of Machinists in Toronto, are among those leaving Southern Ontario for Montreal, where the Marine Trades Federation is holding a special convention.

ELECTED TO EXECUTIVE

Nelson Dyer, the popular member of Lansdowne barns division of the Street Railwaymen's Union in Toronto, was yesterday elected to represent Lansdowne barns on the executive of the union. Tom Gould ran him a close second. Altogether 108 votes were cast.

RAILWAY FREIGHT CLERKS

W. D. MacPherson, general organizer for the Canadian Brotherhood of Freight Clerks and Stationmen, stated last night that he and the committee of the brotherhood had been able to prove to the officials of the Grand Trunk that his organization represents the class of railroad workers in his organization. Asked if this meant that the G.T.R. would refuse to recognize the representatives of the International Brotherhood of Freight Clerks and Stationmen, Mr. MacPherson stated that that was something which the G.T.R. would have to decide. He himself was satisfied that this railroad would recognize his brotherhood in all negotiations affecting the trade.

OLD MEN RETURN TO RANKS.

Lieut.-Col. W. K. Walker, D.S.O. (with bar), M.C., Croix de Guerre, director of machine guns arrived in the city yesterday on a brief visit to inspect the First Canadian Brigade, stationed at the Armouries. "It is a splendid organization," said the colonel, referring to the corps. "We are getting all the old men back and all ranks have a high state of efficiency."

PRESBYTERIAN PASTOR ILL

Rev. J. McP. Scott, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, contracted double pneumonia. Dr. K. A. Jones, his physician, held a conference of several specialists which resulted in the report that Mr. Scott was in a serious condition.

MORE INDICATIONS OF REAL PROGRESS

Building Trades Council
Formed With Large
Executive Powers.

No longer is there a building trades league in Toronto. Progress has led the footsteps of labor for many months to the immense advantage of the movement, and last night the league unanimously decided to change its status from the voluntary and therefore heterogeneous to a homogeneous unit of twenty trades involved. This means that henceforth all the twenty trades, in what has now become the Toronto Building Trades Council, will be subject to the rulings of that council, that all unions in the trade will be compelled to join this council, and that no union will henceforth be able to act upon its own initiative. That is to say, no union will be able to either refuse to go into a strike when the council orders one or to call a strike on its own, all such authority now being transferred to the council itself, which henceforth will act in a parliamentary and executive capacity.

Thruout labor circles this action upon the part of what was once a merely voluntary body of unions spells a new era for the general labor movement, in that it co-ordinates the work of all the units within the council, and centralizes executive power, thus forging a true bond of sympathy and common-sense. It had been the custom among some unions to go on their own, irrespective of the troubles of others, this selfish attitude will no longer have leeway.

The Building Trades Council decided to act in co-operation with the industrial council, a body composed of both trades unionists and employers; it decided to reaffirm its affiliation with the American Federation of Labor; it pledged its support to the international union in the trade seeking to protect its rights, and thus pledged itself to support the iron workers and other workers in similar positions.

Builders Communicated With.

Communications have been sent on to those employers in the building trade who have not fallen in with the ideals of the Building Trades Council, advising them of the seriousness of the situation, and of the immediate need of proper adjustment of the situation. It was pointed out that any dispute now existent was merely a question of recognition of the principles of trades unionism, and had no direct relation to wages or hours.

The council endorsed a letter sent down from Local 145, Porcupine Miners' Union, denouncing the policy of the Labor Leader and the men alleged to be trafficking in cement in the dust before the employers of the province. Copies of this letter were ordered sent on to the press.

UNIVERSITY NOTES

Acting on imperative advice from her physician, Miss Skinner, the popular head of the Victoria Women's Students' Union, has been forced to hand in her resignation to Chancellor Bowles. Miss Skinner had been connected with the union since its inauguration in 1917.

As a result of the complete resignation of the University College Undergraduate Association, a provisional council was appointed yesterday, consisting of Miss Mary Reid '20, Jean Christie '20, Elizabeth Cring '21, Margaret Reid '22, and Katherine Ruthford '22.

Until the spring elections, a new constitution is very badly needed in the general feeling among the students to belong to this association, while others believe waiting until the spring elections before a change is made.

The Varsity, the university students' newspaper, continues to receive a strong opposition to the intended letter to James Addams, who has been invited to speak in the future at Convocation Hall. The general feeling among the students is varied, some not desiring his appearance on the grounds that her appearance during the war would be in direct contrast to her appearance here at this university.

At this university, that no nobly did share during the recent world-wide struggle, while others maintain that as a social service problem in the United States and that her appearance here is a welcome one. The writer of the condemning letter, who signs himself or herself "Pro Italia," has been invited by the editor of The Varsity to make a definite statement of the time and place of the utterances that he attributes to Miss Addams and his reply will be worth watching for.

RETAIL CLOTHIERS DISCUSS RULING OF COMMERCE BOARD

Second Annual Convention
Opens With Many Dele-
gates in Attendance.

FAVOR CANADIAN TRADE

Discussion of the clothing order, as it affected the retailer, was the principal item of business before the afternoon session of the second annual convention of the Ontario Retail Clothiers' Association, which opened yesterday at the King Edward Hotel. The convention will continue for three days.

Premier Drury was unable to attend, also Controller Maguire, who is ill with the influenza. Controller Ramsden officiated.

It was pointed out by President Ed Mack in his opening address that the ruling of the board of commerce allowed 30 per cent. on all goods coming down and 33 1-3 per cent. on all goods costing over \$20.

"If this Ontario body cannot show just reasons why they cannot do business on the mark-up the board has made a ruling on," said Mr. Mack, "it will become law through Ontario."

"Now, it has been shown conclusively to the government that clothiers throughout Canada cannot do business on that mark-up. Let us meet it in a cool and unemotional manner and not let the members of the board of commerce gentlemen and, as servants of the government, who are not to be trifled with, stop all profiteering and fraudulent advertising in the clothing business."

The greatest offender is not the merchant who marks his goods at 33 1-3 per cent. profit and gives 10 per cent. value in goods and service for every dollar he receives, but the unscrupulous dealer who takes the public into the daily press that he is giving the public \$40 to \$50 suits for \$25 and so on. Let us adopt 'truth in advertising' as our slogan.

There is also another very important matter to the government that clothiers throughout America, and also by cancelling what goods we have already bought, or if we cannot do that, let us let the stand the major portion of the exchange."

The report presented by Secretary R. F. Pittman, showed that while the first annual convention was somewhat of a venture, the co-operation of the clothing manufacturers the convention was financed, leaving a small credit balance of \$19.64 on hand.

Pointing out that the association had only been organized in Ontario for one year, Mr. Fitzpatrick predicted that a Dominion-wide organization would be formed within the coming year. He stated that there was a growing need for this.

"We will be a force to be reckoned with when it comes to laws being enacted that will hamper us in the proper merchandizing of our business, but we on the other hand should stand up for the rights of the consumer on all legislation that we deem fair and just, and oppose it if in our wisdom we feel it to be in the best interests of the country."

In view of the reported willingness of the government to cancel the goods of commerce, to meet a committee and co-operate in arriving at a solution of the problem, Mr. Mack stated that the province outside of Toronto, Mr. Fitzpatrick suggested that a committee of the Ontario Retail Clothiers' Association be formed to meet with the Major Duncan while the convention was in session.

While the address of H. B. Muir, advertising manager of The London Free Press, thru illness, his address dealing with the retail trade, was read by George Scroggie, of The Mail and Empire. The address was as follows:

"It wasn't much of a trick to make money in the clothing business last year. The clothing store took \$100,000,000 of goods and sold them for \$150,000,000. The direct sales charge involved in marketing goods of this kind is about 10 per cent. This article comes to be sold at \$135, and it has only been possible to cut the price of the goods to \$125. The sales people to a degree that reduces the direct sales charge involved in marketing goods of this kind is about 10 per cent. Of course, the percentage that was formerly 6 per cent. then would become 4 per cent. Many of the goods are in the cost of doing business as well as the total cost of operating would be a change in the same direction."
