"I am delighted with my situation here, with the professors, the students, and the institution in general. I regret very much not to have come much sooner to the knowledge of the truth, there would not be so much to undo in me. I rejoice to know, however, that the Holy Spirit is a good workman, and that He will perfect His work in me. I am highly edified in seeing in the numerous company of students here so much godliness; while most of them, college graduates they exhibit the most sincere and child-like faith. What different training these young men must have received from that which we French Canadians generally receive. I begin to feel quite at home in the Baptist church, it is so simple and apostolical in its constitution. I must acknowledge, however, that I, at first, found it very difficult to realize that I was under the government of Jesus Christ. I could not help having before my eyes the Pope with his sceptre of authority. If Roman Catholics could only see the great change that within the last few months has been wrought in me, they would think it more wonderful than a revolution among the celestial bodies. I, myself, could not have thought the thing possible. From an extreme ultramontane I have become a confirmed Baptist. My prayer to God now is that I may be prepared thoroughly to labor for the salvation of souls and the ultimate triumph of the truth. May the Lord be my guide and helper."
