BORDEN AND PROVINCIAL PREMIERS SPEAK HERE

Conservative Leader and Hon. Messrs. Roblin, Hanna, Hazen, Geo. W. Fowler, Dr. Daniel and Dr. Macrae Heard to Advantage in the Victoria Rink

The Conservative mass meeting in the Victoria Rink last evening was addressed by R. L. Borden, the Conservative leader, Hon. R. P. Roblin, premier of Manitoba, Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary of Ontario, Premier Hazen and others. There were about 2,000 people present. The speakers were greeted on their way to the rink by the Carleton Cornet Band and on arrival were received with much cheering. W. H. Thorne presided at the meeting.

Mr. Hanna, who was received with much cheering, conveyed the regrets of Sir James Whitney, who was unable to be present. He went on to refer to planks in the Halifax platform of 1907 and how they would affect the people of Ontario, New Brunswick and other parts of Canada. He contended that it was a sound business proposition for the electors to judge their trustees as an employer would do. He claimed that the people should not shut their eyes to wrong being done by the government in breaking pledges.

He criticised an editorial in the Sun representing that the government in four years increased the provincial expenditure by \$2,500,000 and said that increased revenue from careful administration had made this possible. He discussed Mr. Borden's declaration with regard to immigration and condemned the action of the Laurier government in admitting as settlers people from the South of Europe, claiming that the inmates of the insane asylums in Ontario were increased 90 per cent in one year from this cause.

Discussing the elections, he said that out of eighty-six Ontario seats no less than sixty-five would support Mr. Borden and that many Liberals disputed with the dishonesty of their leaders would give their support. Mr. Hanna quoted Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement that he would reform the Liberal party from within, and claimed that such reform was the privilege of the electors. He referred to speeches made by Hon. Wm. Pugsley in Ontario in which the latter had said he would state how much money was given to a party to speak after the platform had been laid down in 1907.

Mr. Borden then went on to refer to waste of public money, claiming that \$10,000,000 had been wasted, and that St. John had been left to her own devices while it had gone to finance the National Trading Company and other similar schemes.

There was, Mr. Borden continued, one supreme question, that there should be an honest administration of public money and of the public domain. The government were in the position of trustees, and

All yesterday the trains and boats brought crowds of strangers to the city. The result was that last night there was not a hotel in the city with an unoccupied bedroom. In many instances coats were pressed into service and people were glad of even this accommodation. So great was the demand for rooms that private boarding houses were in some instances taxed to their utmost capacity.

The exhibition judging bureau did a rushing business directing people to places where they might lodge. Glorious weather and the consequent large attendance marked the third day of St. John's big fair and the management believe success is assured if the weather man keeps on his good behavior. Today will see the big excursions from the country and the agricultural people. Tomorrow will be much in evidence on the grounds this afternoon and evening. The Milltown band will come in this morning and entertain in the main building in the afternoon and evening.

Yesterday dawned bright and fair and the enthusiastic members of the exhibition executive, who rose with the sun, were overjoyed at the prospects of the day. The visitors to the city began to arrive at the grounds early and the stock exhibit was inspected by many. Judging was carried on in the various classes and it was advanced for so early a date. The fine herds of R. A. Snowball, C. A. Archibald and W. W. Black were to the front in the beef classes and honors were pretty evenly divided. Mr. Black had almost a clean sweep in these herds.

After the afternoon look fairly successful, it was not till evening that the management realized they had experienced a most successful day. A steady stream of people kept the turnstiles on the move between 7 and 8 o'clock and at that hour the buildings were well crowded. When the fireworks were announced the large space in front of the carriage hall and the magnificent spectacle offered was viewed by thousands. The final piece, the eruption of Mount Vesuvius, called forth expressions of admiration.

Immediately after the fireworks the clever diving horses performed and the grand stand was filled for the event. The shows in both the amusement halls were well patronized. After the performance of Adgie last evening she fed her lions in view of the spectators. On the Pike the shows are doing good business and some are obliged to close rather early on account of lack of patronage. Perfect order was maintained and the only untoward incident was the falling from grace of a special policeman who was found in an awkward position on the main entrance.

Machinery Hall continues to attract and is proving one of the most interesting features of the show. A gentleman's gold watch, a ladies' ring and a purse containing \$1 and a ticket to Moncton were found on the exhibition grounds yesterday and left in the manager's office.

One of the interesting exhibits on the Pike is the little horse, Geromino, shown by its owner, Prince Starlight, an orphaned daughter of the Indian chieftain Geromino. The horse, which is a handsome little thing, coal black, stands twenty-four inches high and weighs 393 pounds. It was born almost three years ago, near Phoenix, Arizona, and is a cross between a standard-bred horse and an Indian broncho.

The owner, Princess Starlight, is at the fair with her little pet and she makes an attractive picture in her var-colored Indian costume. A brother of the little lady is with her and he explains very interestingly all about the animal.
