## Churches Must be Made Over If They Are To Be Ready For Boys When They Come Home

If Our Soldiers Come Home to Churches Sleepy, Short Sighted, Unenterprising, Without Vision or Aspiration, With No Plan of Campaign or High, Heroic Spirit, They Will Turn Aside, Says Captain W. A. Cameron; Calls For Interdenominational Co-operation, Vigorous Religious Crusades, Broader Humanity, Social Service, and Aggressive Evangelism

No Canadian preacher has come into more intimate touch with our soldiers at the front as Captain W. A. Cameron, pastor of Bloor street Baptist church, who called this week to resume his evangelistic work in France as the special representative of the Y.M.C.A. While on two months' leave, Captain Cameron, in conjunction with Major Birks, has raised over \$100,000 for Y.M.C.A. work among the Canadian boys in England and France. All last winter Capt. Cameron labored among the men in France, sharing their hardships and dangers and discussing their religious problems with them. In the following article he tells how the churches of Canada must be transformed if they are to attract, rather than repel, the boys when they come home, and take advantage of the splendid spiritual impulses that have been awakened in their lives. The article, written at our request, covers much of the same ground as Captain Cameron's farewell sermon, "When the Boys Come Home."

while many who were thoughtless at home, have continued to be thoughtless abroad, the religious have taken their religion with them, and hundreds of the former have joined the category of the latter. They do not talk the conventional language of piety, but there is many an indication that the really great things have become real to them. I always found it a moving sight to face in a Y.M.C.A. but a congregation of these brawny, rollicking, eager men—some born fighters itching to destroy the enemy who have made havoc of peace on earth, others hating the whole brutal business of war, yet doing their bit gamely—all of them jeopardizing their lives when life is sweet and flushed with hope, courting danger rather than taking cover, and all of them listening to an address on a great gospel theme, and then giving themselves as the conveners did long ago to prayer and to God. The surface shyness about religion has melted, and everywhere men are not ashamed to profess that faith is the bread of their souls. They talk about the great things, though they have neither time for tinkering on the niceties of creeds nor enthusiasm about the shibboleths of sects. Up against the elemental facts they appreciate the value of the elemental verities. The lit of their souls is furnished with the weapons that win victory over danger and death. Not through these will Britain be put to shame!

It is for the people at home to make their thinking and saying and doing worthy of them and our great cause. The splendor of their youthful courage and sacrifice has a meaning for the Christian church.
