DETAILED PLANS OF CATHOLIC GYMNASIUM

Fine Structure at Corner of Waterloo and Cliff Streets to be Ready in Spring

It has been recognized by the Catholic people of the city that for their boys and young men a central meeting place with an up-to-date gymnasium, library, swimming pool, assembly hall, and other modern appointments, was greatly needed.

The solution of the problem is anticipated in the erection of a handsome new building under the direction of His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc on the corner of Waterloo and Cliff streets, work upon which is now proceeding.

On this floor the departments are thus divided, certain rooms being for the use of juniors, others for the seniors.

There are various other rooms of lesser importance to be included in the new building, with certain outstanding features as for instance a modern track for athletic purposes, thirty-three traps to the mile, and a gallery about the gym.
