### LANCASTER LADIES DO GREAT WORK FOR SOLDIERS

There is an Opportunity For Men To Do Their Share

The patriotic and thrifty ladies of Lancaster are certainly doing their share these days as shown by the quantity of useful articles they made up during the month for the boys at the front. Besides the 500 respirators already mentioned, they made up 207 hospital slits, of which 400 are to go direct to Dr. MacLaren's hospital. Forty-eight sheets were also prepared and pillow cases, besides a large number of pairs of socks and several suits of pyjamas.

It takes a lot of material to manufacture the articles specified and material costs money. The ladies are very busy and no doubt would welcome assistance in furthering the good work. If some of the men who—from various causes are unable to do the king's uniform, copied the spirit of the ladies and made some sacrifice, no doubt the funds of the society would be considerably augmented.

Such a worthy object is a call to the entire community, and it should not be forgotten that there is a patriotic duty at home to be considered as well as the battlefield, and either the one or the other holds every citizen responsible.

### GERMAN SNIPER BEGGED FOR MERCY BECAUSE HE HAD AN UNCLE IN CANADA

Dominion Lady Bayonets Not Relieved by Enemy, Writes Charles Kelly To Mother Here

Following are extracts from a letter received by Mrs. M. Kelly of 84 St. Patrick street, from her son, Charles, dated June 9:

Dear Mother—I received your letter and was very glad to hear from you, am in the best of health and like the work I am doing fine. I take rations to the 218 Battery. It is quite exciting sometimes, but I would rather be right in the trenches fixing some of those rotten Germans. I just wish I was as big as some of the fellows in this outfit now, and I'll bet I would get a few of those Germans on the bayonets. The Germans are all right at shooting at a distance of fifty or seventy-five yards away, but they yell for mercy when a bayonet is near them.

One Canadian was telling me he caught a German sniper and he yelled for mercy and said "he had an uncle in Canada," but the Canadian said to him "with you, and I will get your uncle when I get back to Canada. ### NEED TO ENLARGE BUT MONEY IS NECESSARY

Annual Meeting of Directors of the Home For Aged Females

The annual meeting was held at 8:30 o'clock this afternoon in the Home for Aged Females, Broad Street, when the annual report of the directors was read and a successful year but pointing to the need of greater financial assistance to meet the demands upon them.

The finances for the year were about as usual and the home was filled to its capacity. There are many applicants who cannot be received on account of the limited facilities and he pointed out that, if funds were available, it would be desirable to build an extension. For this they would need not only the money for building purposes but also an addition to the endowment to meet the extra cost of maintenance.

### SON OF SIR HIBBERT TUPPER IS WOUNDED

Lieutenant Reginald Tupper, son of Sir Hibbert, who was wounded in the great battle of St. Julien in April, has had an almost miraculous escape from death. Lieutenant Tupper was shot first through the thigh, the bullet passing through the lower part of his body. Though badly crippled he managed to crawl back to his gun, and was sticking to it when another German bullet found him. He was shot through both legs, one leg being broken and his heel was shot off. In this state he succeeded in crawling a distance of 200 yards to a trench, where he hoped to be picked up by stretcher-bearers. He remained there some hours before help came, and he was removed to the base. Gangrene developed on the journey and the doctors gave him up. Despite his wounds and the blood poison, he has pulled through and has now been moved to a hospital in England, where his chances of ultimate recovery are said to be good. Captain Merritt, Lieutenant Tupper's brother-in-law, who was beside him in the fight was killed.

### ASK THE MAYOR HOW WAR IS AFFECTING ST. JOHN

The Canadian Union of Municipalities is undertaking an investigation into actual conditions in the cities and towns of Canada and is sending to each mayor a list of questions. The list received by Mayor Rank this morning is as follows:

How is the war now affecting local business?

Are your industries at present suffering? Have any benefited? To what extent?

How is the war now affecting your local charities and social work?

What is the outlook of trade at the present moment?

What are the prospects of your municipality after the war?

The mayor is considering sending out a circular to representative business men in various lines to secure more definite information on some of these subjects.

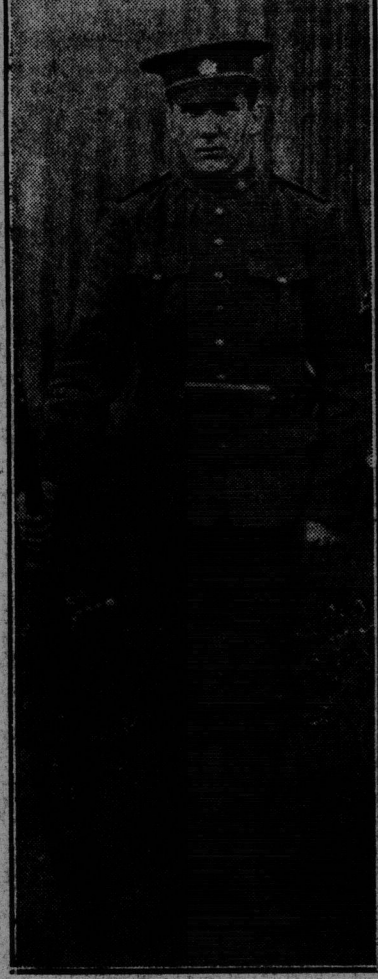
CONGRATULATIONS

### ELLSWORTH REID NOT KILLED BUT IN WOUNDED LIST

Ottawa Sends Word That Will Bring Relief to Simonds Street Home

An official report from Ottawa this morning mentioned Ellsworth J. Reid of the Princess Patricia among the wounded. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Rupert P. Reid, 17 Simonds street, and



has been mourned for dead since the first of the month.

On June 3 Miss Emma Reid received a letter from Driver G. Lister informing her that her brother had been killed during one of the battles. The letter, although giving no particulars, rent the hearts of the parents, who had daily been in hopes that their son would live to return to them. Friends argued that it was possible a mistake had been made and thus a spark of hope lingered in the breasts of the sorrowing parents. This morning that spark took new life when word reached the city that their son was among the wounded and not killed, as reported in the letter.

Private Reid left St. John with the first contingent and was one of the first to be chosen to fill a gap made in the ranks of the Princess Patricia. What the extent of his wounds are is not known, but friends hope that they are not serious.
