

SPORT NEWS GLEANED FROM WORLD'S CENTRES

BIG INTERNATIONAL SKATING MEET IS BROUGHT TO STIRRING CLOSE

Joe Moore Wins Title—Fine Showing Made by All Contestants.

Joe Moore of New York was crowned International Indoor Skating Champion at the conclusion of the big meet at the Arena last evening. He amassed a total of 180 points, while his nearest competitor, Duke Donovan of St. Paul, totaled 80. Charlie Gorman of this city was third with 40.

The feature events on the programme last evening were the 440 yards and the three-miles and the large number of enthusiasts present were treated to many thrills during the bitterly contested struggle for premier honors. Gorman made the best time in the 440 yards and he was cheered to the echo as he flashed across the line a winner in his preliminary heat and semi-final. He made a game fight for the final, but tired while leading on the last lap and in making one of the turns went wide, tripped and crashed into the boards. He was badly shaken up and did not feel able to compete in the three-mile grind. However, he had given his many admirers an opportunity to see him skate and they were well satisfied.

They Shake Hands.

One of the pleasing features of the evening was witnessed prior to the start of the big meet when Charlie Gorman skated to the centre of the ice and there shook hands with Referee Taylor. This act won ringing applause and the little unpleasantness of the former evening's races was forgotten and he was given a reception that must have made him realize the position he holds in the hearts of the sports-loving public of his home town.

'Bobby' Caught Them All.

One of the big attractions last evening was Bobby Hearn of New York, who not only gave a very clever demonstration of barrel jumping, but also kept the large audience amused by his antics. That he is a great favorite with St. John fans was evident and he well merited the plaudits showered upon him. Paul Forsman also did some good barrel jumping.

Well Done, Garnett.

The showing of Frank Garnett was another feature. His game finish in the three-mile event won for him the admiration of all and he was loudly cheered as he was assisted to the dressing room. The lap prize for the three-mile race was won by Francis Allen of Chicago. It was a sweater donated by Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Ltd. The one-mile lap prize was won by Bernard O'Connor on Monday night. It was donated by Oak Hall. A three-quarter mile lap prize, presented by Waterbury & Rising, Ltd., went to Joe Moore.

The handsome cup donated by the New Brunswick Power Company was won by Joe Moore for making the highest number of points.

The Juniors.

In the 18-year-old event O'Neill Farrell won the 220-yards and captured the championship with a total of 90 points. E. Snodgrass of this city finished with 80 points.

In the 16-year-old class A. Oland made a great showing and captured first in the half and one-mile events. Clement O'Connor and C. H. Smythe of Moncton tied for second place with 50 points. Oland won premier honors in this class with a total of 70 points.

The work of the various officials won highly complimentary remarks from the thousands of people in attendance and the success of the big meet was largely attributed to their untiring efforts. H. L. Nixon's name was inadvertently omitted in Tuesday's paper from the list of those giving excellent service in this regard.

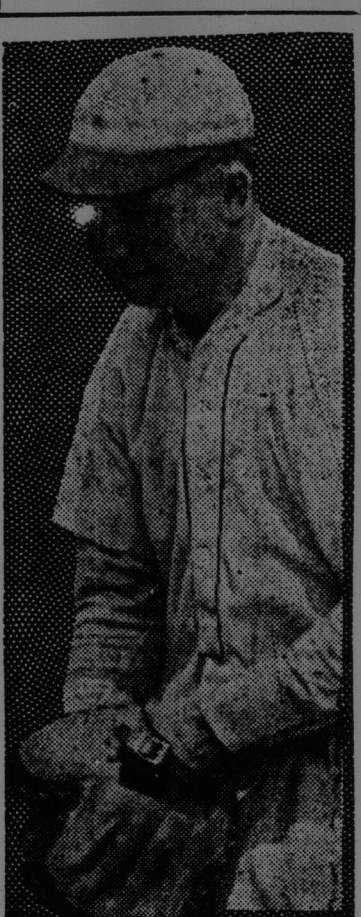

Manager of Cleveland Indians Will Visit Hot Springs.

Cleveland, Feb. 28.—Manager Tris Speaker of the Cleveland American League team will visit Hot Springs, Ark., to look over his pitcher's new training and taking the bath there, before they start for the spring training camp at Lakeland, Fla., on March 7. Speaker wired Coach Jack McAllister today, according to word from the spa. Speaker will reach Hot Springs on March 3, spend four days here and leave with the squad for Lakeland.

Speaker also wired McAllister that he is sending him a young pitcher named Earl, 17 years old, with instructions to look him over. Where the youngster comes from Speaker did not say.

CHILEAN MAY MEET CHAMPION DEMPSEY

Romero-Rojas, However, Must Dispose of Three Opponents First.

New York, Feb. 28.—(Associated Press)—Jack Dempsey may be called on to defend his heavyweight championship against a new South American menace next fall, if present plans of Tex Rickard materialize. The promoter announced that he had guaranteed Quintin Romero-Rojas, Chilean heavyweight, a purse of \$100,000 for a title fight with Jack Dempsey, possibly in September, if he succeeds in disposing of three preliminary opponents. Rickard has come to a definite agreement with the Chilean and cabled the boxer to fix the earliest possible date on which he can reach this country.

Romero-Rojas has been offered the same opportunity to gain ring fame and financial reward that fell to Luis Angel Firpo last year. Rickard said, adding that reports reaching him justified the prediction that the Chilean might prove even a greater sensation than the Argentine, who gained a match with Dempsey after cutting a wide swath through heavyweight ranks.

At the same time, Rickard revealed that he has no definite agreement with Firpo for a return match with Dempsey and that he may abandon plans for such a contest if Romero-Rojas demonstrates that he is a fit challenger for the champion. The promoter made it plain that he is dissatisfied with Firpo's failure to respond to recent overtures for matches here this year and was ready to cancel the Argentine's proposed part in his heavyweight programme unless the "Wild Bull" assumes a different attitude.

Rickard has received the assurance of Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, that the champion would be ready to meet Romero-Rojas if the latter comes up to expectations. According to present plans, the Chilean will be staged at Madison Square Garden, with Fred Fulton or Floyd Johnson as an opponent. Should he emerge victorious, the doctor would seek to meet Romero-Rojas and Firpo.

SISLER IS READY TO TRY COMEBACK

Says That He is Confident in His Ability to Make Good.

Mobile, Ala., Feb. 28.—Rain has interfered with spring practice of the St. Louis Browns, and also kept George Sisler from appearing in a baseball uniform for the first time in over a year's absence. Sisler, who came here from Laguna Beach, Cal., announced that he was in best of health, and that he will take his place on the infield and try for a comeback.

The former star expresses confidence in his ability to return to the game as a first sacker, the position that he held for many years. Sisler added that he had not determined anything definite about taking up the duties of a pitcher. Trainer Jimmy Austin of the Browns is much more confident about the comeback of Sisler than the famous ballplayer himself. He said: "If I can judge correctly Sisler will be just as good as he was prior to the eye trouble which caused his temporary retirement. Out on the Pacific coast he took part in light pitching and batting, and the same old stuff was there. I don't want to be too sanguine, but if I am any judge of a man's condition, Sisler will be back in the running again this year," Austin said.

TEX RICKARD TO RENEW FIGHT BID

Would Stage Wills-Firpo Bout in Jersey City in July.

New York, Feb. 28.—(Associated Press).—With practical abandonment by a New York syndicate of efforts to match Firpo and Harry Wills in July, because of a deadlock over preliminary guarantees and conditions, Rickard declared he stood ready to renew his recent offer for such a contest.

Rickard's proposition of \$100,000 to Wills and \$200,000 to Firpo was rejected by both fighters, but the promoter said he would not alter this bid. He said he is ready to stage such a fight in Doyle's Thirty Acres, his Jersey City arena, in July, if his terms are accepted. The syndicate's offer was for a purse of \$500,000, to be evenly divided by the principals.

Meanwhile, Firpo's American representative, William McCarny, said the Argentine planned to return to the United States in about the middle of April and go on an extensive fighting tour. According to McCarny, offers for fights include one with Jack Renald at Windsor, Canada, May 24, and another with Floyd Johnson in Cleveland. Others are from Memphis, St. Louis, Chicago, New Orleans, St. Paul, Philadelphia, Philadelphia, Kalamazoo, Mich., and Louisville.
