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BRADFORD, ONT., HAS EXPERIENCE OF WILD STORM

Bradford, Ont., May 30.—Bradford and surrounding country on Saturday afternoon witnessed the worst storm in the history of this vicinity. For two hours the rain came in torrents. Trees rapidly assumed the proportions of rivers, bridges were washed away and roads were badly damaged. The Fontank road was so torn up that traffic on it will have to be suspended for more than a week.

One thousand feet of the Grand Trunk Railway track was washed out. It will not be fully restored until tonight. In the meantime traffic on the northern division of the Grand Trunk is being sent around by way of Georgetown.

Hypnotism? (Country Life, London.) Sir William Osler's book, letterpress and pictures together, supply an unforgettable memorial of France as he saw it in 1917-18. The pictures have mostly been seen on exhibition. The description and horror they express is mitigated but still easily visible in the black and white reproductions. Busanese, La Boisselle, Pozieres, Peronne and the No Man's Land which follows it, Courcelles—the story of the shell-torn landscape. Sir William Osler as an artist is unrelenting. Scarred earth, fragments of buildings, the wounded lying, the madness caused by terror, nothing is omitted. Here is a country hurried back for having taken wings and flown from it. Nor is this impression relieved by any anything in the shape of strained language. He does not burst into eloquence, nor does he feel himself in any way obliged to omit the pleasant moments of his tour, the cheerful occasions that lighten the gloom. He is entirely unaffected and describes whatever comes along with an unpretentious sincerity that is more effective than any quantity of purple passages.

Contract for the Douglas Avenue Paving is Signed. The contract between the city and the Stephen Construction Company was signed at City Hall this morning and the contractors have already started the work on the sidewalks in Douglas avenue. The curb alone is being dug up and dressed and the forms being laid for the concrete sidewalks. About twenty men were started on the job this morning, but this crew will be added to as the work progresses. It is expected that arrangements will be made with the street railway company to break the service on both lines during operations and transfer across the section on which work is being carried out.

HYDRO MATTERS C. O. Ross, chief engineer of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, said this morning that the contractors expected to start work on the Musquash power house soon. A derrick had been erected on the site and preparations commenced for the placing of a coffer dam to be used in connection with the laying of the foundation of the power house and the end pier of the new steel bridge which will cross the river at that point.
