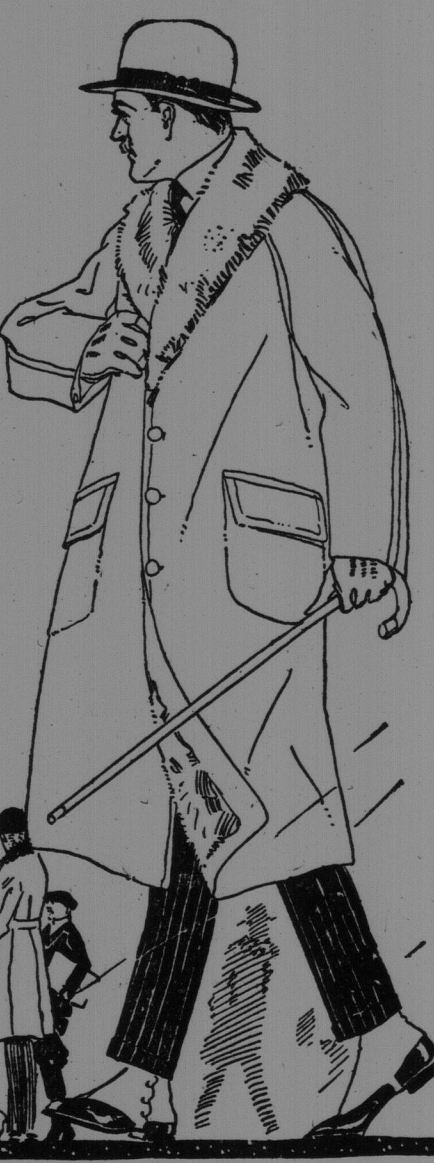

### IN THE CHURCHES

Rev. J. A. Elson, of Hamilton, Ont., a missionary in China and Japan, delivered a stirring sermon yesterday in the Queen Square Methodist church. He is preaching in the interests of the inter-church movement.

The eightieth anniversary of the founding of Centenary Methodist church was celebrated yesterday. Rev. W. H. Barracough of Moncton, a former pastor, conducted both services. W. C. Goddard, who attended the dedicatory services in 1880, was present.

Reports of the recent boys' conference in Moncton were given at the morning service in Exmouth street yesterday by Ernest Hopkins, Walter Thomas, George Purdy and Harold Hopkins. E. T. Thomas, superintendent of the Sunday school, told of the recent convention of the Maritime Sunday School Association in Amherst. The pastor, G. F. Lawson, also gave an interesting address.

In Brussels street Baptist church yesterday the Reformed Baptist church held service for the first time since selling its church in Carleton street to the Seventh Day Adventists. They are contemplating building a new church.

Rev. J. A. MacKeigan announced at yesterday's service that St. David's would hold their next Sunday service in the new church. It is expected that Rev. Principal MacKinnon, D. D., of Pine Hill, will officiate.

The service in the Germain street Baptist church last evening was under auspices of the Y. M. A. Among those who took part were Lewis Simms, George Currie, Stewart Smith, David Thompson, Dr. P. L. Bonnell and Mrs. Archibald. Rev. S. S. Poole preached an excellent sermon.

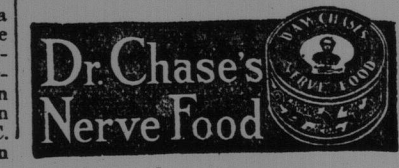
