Not Agreed  
On Exchange  
Of Pulpits

Discussion In Church  
Of England  
Synod

Thinks Saviour Soon To Come

Rev. R. P. McKim Expresses His  
Solemn Belief—Rev. Mr. Kuhring  
Opens Subject on Report of  
Committee on Bishop's Charge

A discussion marked by intense seriousness and deep feeling occurred at this morning's session of the Anglican synod arising from the report of the standing committee on Bishop Richardson's charge and in particular a section of the report expressing agreement with the pronouncement on the matter of Christian unity.

Rev. G. A. Kuhring started the discussion with a frank statement that while yielding fullest respect to the bishop, he could not agree with him in the matter of the exchange of pulpits with clergyman of other denominations and pressed for greater liberty in this matter.

The difficulty finally was solved by the adoption of an amended proposal which did not commit the synod to agreement with the bishop's interpretation of the rules.

The business session continues this afternoon and this evening the delegates, with their hosts and hostesses will be the guests of Sir Douglas and Lady Harcourt at their home.

Rev. G. A. Kuhring did not agree with His Lordship on the pronouncement that clergy of the church should neither permit nor receive the exchange of pulpits with clergy of other denominations.

British Chancellor Faces Heavy  
Task—New Taxes Expected in  
Budget

London, April 30—A statement on the government's budget was made to the House of Commons today by Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer.

On the previous occasions the budgets were converted into tasks and there was no difficulty in making the national revenues and expenditures balance.

He appealed to the common sense of the church and referred to many precedents as existing.

Mr. Kuhring's remarks were greeted with hearty applause and the speaker declared that he recognized that there was a difference of opinion on this subject but he felt it his duty to make his own position clear.

Rev. R. P. McKim said that the terms of the charge had caused disappointment and aroused a feeling of suspicion among these brethren in other churches.

His lordship said his charge represented his convictions arrived at after twenty years of thought on the subject. It said exactly what he meant.

Statement on Adriatic Question  
is Given to Public

Sees No Justification For Including  
Fiume Within Boundaries of  
Italian Kingdom—Says it Should  
Enjoy Very Considerable De-  
gree of Autonomy

Paris, April 29—(By the Associated Press)—A statement was issued tonight in commenting on the speech of Premier Orlando before the Italian parliament.

There is no question to which I have given more careful or anxious thought than I have given to this, because in common with all my colleagues it is my earnest desire to see the utmost justice done to Italy.

"Personally I am quite willing that Italy should be accorded along the whole front of her northern frontier and wherever she comes into contact with Austrian territory, all that is necessary is a single reservation by the powers associated against Germany and will constitute the basis of peace with Germany."

"It is with these facts in mind that I have approached the Adriatic question. It is commonly agreed, and I very heartily adhere to the agreement, that the ports of Trieste and Pola, and with them the greater part of the Italian peninsula, will touch countries stripped of the military and naval power of Austria, settled in inter-dependence of Austria and Italy."

There would be no justification, in my judgment, in including Fiume, or any part of the coast line to the south of Fiume, within the boundaries of the Italian kingdom.

"I believe there will be common agreement that the island of Lissa should be ceded to Italy, and that she should retain the port of Volosca. I believe that it will be generally agreed that the former government established upon the islands near the eastern coast of the Adriatic should be permanently dispersed with unrestricted freedom, and that the arrangement which is to be arranged under the League of Nations should limit the states on the eastern coast of the Adriatic to only such minor naval forces as are necessary for policing the waters of the islands and the coast.
