**TRAINS LATE**  
The incoming trains to the city today were late. The Montreal was an hour and ten minutes, while the Boston was fifty minutes behind time. There was heavy travel on both trains, a large number of tourists coming to the city or passing through.

**TO BUILD RESIDENCES AT SEA VIEW HEIGHTS**  
Although building operations are going on extensively all over the city as the recent statement of the Canadian Building permits shows yet for actual work of construction whether of factories or dwelling houses the west side still leads the van.

In addition to the work already under way, the St. John Realty and Development Company, of which H. H. Vineburg is manager, now proposes to erect a number of residences on their property at Sea View Heights. They will all be self-contained, steam-heated, with modern conveniences and as the city is putting water mains through their property the houses will be provided with water as well as sewerage.
