"We were well satisfied with the showing of the Canadian team. With one or two exceptions the team was as good as could have been selected from Canada and all the men performed up to the standard expected. The work of Hallahan in the mile was regarded as the feature of the Canadian team but the showing of the other members was equally good from an athletic standpoint, under more trying conditions.

"Brook of Toronto, while unfortunate in not winning a first, gave a splendid exhibition of running ability and judgment. Tail's two performances in the mile showed him to be not only a runner of great ability but superior in track judgment to his competitors. His win at the empire sports was entirely a win of the head. Lokenham of Ottawa did as well as expected.

Where Prince of Wales Will Live

Clarendon House, to be the abode of the Prince of Wales on attainment of his majority, is a mansion with a history. Built by Sir John Vanburgh for the Earl of Clare, it was pulled down by Robert Clive, and re-erected by "Capability" Brown. It was here, in 1817, that Princess Charlotte died in childbirth. Here, too, Louis Philippe found a refuge after his exile from France, and here both he and his queen died. The present occupant of the house is the Duchess of Albany, who, however, generally prefers Windsor.

Horne Walpole, in a letter to his friend George Montagu, dated August 11, 1788, notes the fact that pineapples were conveyed from Clarendon House to Hanover by courier.

Lord Clive's coming to Clarendon was bitterly resented by the Surrey peasantry. They "loaded with mysterious horrors," writes Macaulay, "on the stately house which was rising at Clarendon, and whispered that the great, wicked lord had ordered the walls to be made so thick, in order to keep out the devil, who would one day carry him away bodily.
