The Situation.
New York, Nov. 8.—It is a question
whether, after all, our troubles are not
still due to the disturbances abroad. The
Paris market is reported as demoralized
by the necessity of the government's
providing for a deficit of \$160,000,000 in
the budget for 1914 and for a new na-
tional loan of \$200,000,000. The contin-
ued tension between Greece and Turkey
and the quiet rumblings of the Balkan
problem keep all Europe unsettled.
German trade is falling and good securi-
ties abroad can be bought to yield high-
er returns than our own, shutting off
our market there. With general con-
fidence in the government's financial
policy unshaken, and a great currency
measure still to be perfected, it is
lowland that the prices of securities are
lower than the market level.

Stocks which represent the business
risk of enterprises may have to wait
for the good earnings, though the main-
tenance of present dividends more or
less uncertain. But good bonds must
pay their interest, whether the stocks

LOCAL NEWS

MEAS IS ANOTHER INCREASE IT ST.

JOHN'S BUSINESS

Mr. Vincent, Home From Europe,
Brings Cheery Word—Some
Announcements

M. L. G. Vincent, manager for the
Oil Motor and Manufacturing Company,
Limited, who was deputed to visit Great
Britain and the continent of Europe,
with a view of studying several engi-
neering propositions, of which oil engines
formed the main point of interest, has
returned after his mission and his re-
ports show that the trip has been most
successful than was expected. He has
with him contracts with some of the
largest firms in Europe for agencies and
for licenses for manufacturing in Can-
ada.

Mr. Vincent left Canada with ad-
dresses of firms in Europe manufacturing
oil engines, and has visited at least
twenty of these factories, making several
types of engines. He has also visited
two exhibitions where oil and gas en-
gines were the main feature. He found
that the type formerly introduced by the
Oil Motor and Mfg. Co., namely the
two-cycle hot-bulb engine, somewhat
called the Semi-Diesel oil engine, is the
type that has been manufactured for
many years, and the fact that it is
nearly exclusively manufactured at
present, and is the predominating type
of engine shown that is the right type
of engine to be adopted for the Cana-
dian market. This is also proved by
the fact that the Campbell Gas Engine
Co., of Halifax, England, are doubling
the size of their machine shops in order
to increase the manufacture of hot-bulb
engines, and this firm employ nearly
1,000 men.

After studying all the best known hot-
bulb engines throughout England,
Germany, Denmark, Sweden,
Holland, Mr. Vincent, visited the
incidentally a factory where he did
not expect to find the engine he
was looking for, notwithstanding the
fact that he knew that oil engines were
manufactured in that hot bulb en-
gine that has been on the market now
for about four years, and has been
planned to him that the fact that this
engine was designed only a short time
ago made it possible for material to be
laid down in this type of oil engine the
best features of all other engines com-
bined, and it was the same man who
designed the engine is the same man

Krusie.

to Canada. Here in the course of his
negotiations he encountered a serious
obstacle in the fact that Munktelis
Melankiska Verksaktiebolag, the firm
who are manufacturing this en-
gine, have been negotiating for a con-
siderable time with the largest water-
turbine-steam-boilers, people in the world
wanted to manufacture the Munktelis
engine in England, and wanted
Canada as sales territory. However, the
Oil Motor Co. now are the Canadian
manufacturers and sales agents for the
oil engines and oil locomotives manu-
factured by the Munktelis Company, and
besides this, Messrs. Munktelis have
taken a generous subscription to the
stock of the local concerns. This lat-
ter fact also insures the stability of the
arrangement, and also guarantees the
success of the proposition, as naturally
the Munktelis Co. will take a more in-
timate interest in the workings of the
Oil Motor Company.

The success of the negotiations was

Engine Co. were formerly represented
by Mr. Vincent and have several plants
in operation in Canada which have all
been very successful without excep-
tion. The Oil Motor Co. have also ob-
tained the agency from Messrs. Graham Bros.
of Stockholm, Sweden, who are manu-
facturers of the most up-to-date passen-
ger elevator in the world, this firm have
been successfully placing their en-
gines in many of the largest build-
ings in cities of the United States,
and the largest of the most up-to-date
large American manufacturers.

The local company will also be in a
position to sell gas engines from the
largest firm in this line in Germany,
while company in Europe so far interest-
ed that they practically decided to start
