The benefit of having the river protected, as has been done by the gentlemen interested in Camp Adams for the last seven or eight years-an extra man's services having been added for two years past by Mr. Call, the lessee of the Crown Lands waters-is fully demonstrated by the numbers of salmon, grilse and trout taken by Camp dams parties, as shown by the camp record book, to which I have already referred. For the first few years the fishing record was not fully kept, but in 1884 the catch was duly entered and the practice has since continued. The record for five years past, stands as fol-

lows :--1884—10 salmon and grilse.
1885—Fishing commenced 29th June and ended 18th August, 82 salmon and grilse. The entries complain of poor luck his year owing to rainfall.
1886—75 salmon and grilse—short sea-

1887—121 salmon and grilse are recorded, and there were more taken, but some of the parties who visited the Camp failed to enter their fish.

1888—From 20th June to 13th July 61 salmon, 83 grilse, 75 trout—the greater number of the latter weighing over 3½ 1bs. each or a total of 219 fish in 23 days. To the above catch of this season nust be added the grilse and trout I caught on my down trip, and, also, 3 salmon and 36 grilse taken by Mr. Jas.
