

At a meeting of the Bricklayers and Masons Union last evening there was a discussion over a complaint from contractors that members of the union were taking contracts for work at \$6.00 a day, the union scale of wages, whereas the contractors make a profit must charge \$4.00 a day. The majority of those present favored fixing the rate at \$4.00 a day for all contracts the members might get in future so as to put the contractors on an equal footing. A committee was appointed to draw up a resolution to that effect to be presented at a meeting on Monday evening next. It was announced that the sanction of the International body had been obtained for the local members to continue working the nine hour day this year, but next year it is stated they will demand the eight-hour day in common with the United States unions. On Monday next the local union will also vote on the election of officers for the International Union and along with other Canadian unions they will support a Canadian for one of the officers.

MONUMENT TO SIR LEONARD NOW ASSURED

At a meeting of the Sir Leonard Tilley Memorial Committee, held last night, it was definitely decided to proceed with the scheme of erecting a monument to the memory of Sir Leonard Tilley, nine feet in height. It is to be erected in a prominent location and is to be ready for unveiling in September of 1910.

Present at last night's meeting with Philip Herbert, the sculptor, were his worship the mayor, Premier Hazen, Messrs. George Robertson, James A. Polson, W. H. FINNEY & N. E. Foster, Hon. Robert Maxwell, Col. J. R. Armstrong and Richard O'Brien.

The meeting upon coming to order decided to resolve itself into a committee of the whole with the following officers: Premier Hazen, his worship the mayor, honorary chairman; George Robertson, chairman; James A. Polson, secretary.

After a general discussion upon the subject of a memorial it was decided to ask Mr. Herbert to submit a model within sixty days. The Common Council will also be petitioned to approve of the site selected.

The proposed statue is to face Charlotte street at the southwest corner of King Square. It is to be nine feet in height, the figure of bronze and the pedestal of granite. The estimated cost, including the unveiling ceremony, will not exceed, it is thought, \$8,000. A considerable portion of this has already been subscribed and an opportunity will later be given the citizens generally to supplement the present fund.

The committee has been assured, it is understood, that the Dominion and federal governments will assist in completing the financial arrangements.

It was pointed out at last night's meeting that since the founding of the city in 1784 no single monument had been raised to the memory of her public men. Mr. Herbert, the sculptor, is in the very front rank of Canadian artists and has created many superb works of art. His work as a sculptor is known throughout Canada and the United States, as well as in Europe. He has been decorated with the Order of St. Michael and St. George by King Edward of England and was created a Chevalier de la Legion of Honour by the President of the Republic of France. Among Mr. Herbert's work the famous Maltonneau monument at Montreal, which is considered one of the finest monuments in America. He was also the maker of two monuments to Queen Victoria, one at Ottawa and one at Hamilton; the monument to the late Sir John A. Macdonald, that of Sir George Cartier, the monument of Franchon de Montmorency Laval at Quebec. He also was the sculptor of the monument to Joseph Howe at Halifax.

Preparations for the observation of the 125th anniversary of St. Andrew's church were advanced last evening at a meeting of the trustees, elders and various committees in charge.

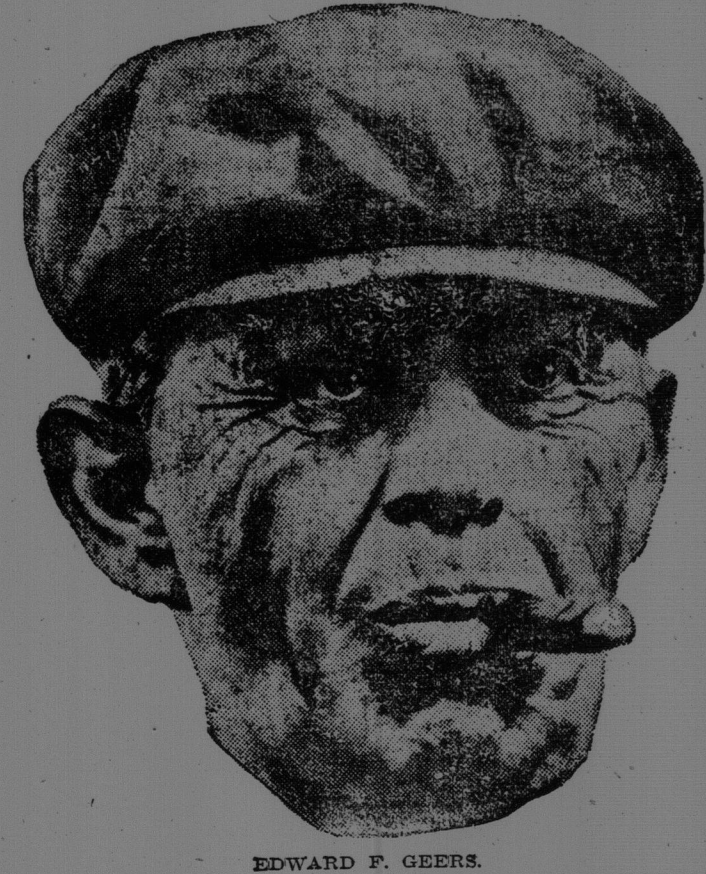

"MARS ED" GEERS HAS RECORD STABLE OF HARNESS HORSES AT MEMPHIS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 11.—As usual, Edward F. Geers, dean of the harness turf, has a big stable this spring at the Billings track. In all "Mars Ed" has 48 animals in training, a record number even for the man who made the Village Farm famous.

It is natural perhaps for the "Silent Man" to hold the season's record. He believes in ascertaining early what a horse can do, so he "searches" his charges sooner than any other trainer in the business. When the majority are working out around 2:30 Geers is settling down his hoppers in 2:10.

Already this spring he has teamed behind Annable Lee and Walter W. miles under 2:11, and has chalked up a record number even for the man who made the Village Farm famous.

Other trainers find fault with the veteran's method of bringing horses to form so early, but as he usually collects a lot of money every season, his plan seems to have something good in it.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES SMALLEST IN MANY YEARS

OTTAWA, Ont., May 10.—Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year totalling \$1,046,857, of which \$3,588 is chargeable to capital account, were presented to parliament today by Hon. Mr. Fielding.

In the main the estimates consist of minor items omitted from the main estimates and which it has now been found necessary to insert to meet unavoidable expenditures during the year. The supplementary estimates are the smallest in many years. Added to the main estimates brought down earlier in the session they provide for a total expenditure for the current fiscal year of \$11,805,460, of which \$8,011,721 is chargeable to consolidated fund and \$3,793,739 to capital account. Further supplementary estimates for the past fiscal year, including \$100,000 for the Italian earthquake relief fund, voted by parliament has been asked to defray the expenses of the quarantine along the International boundary, on account of the outbreak of foot and mouth disease in the United States, and \$100,000 to the International Institute of Agriculture held at Rome last fall, were also tabled.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS IN SESSION IN SYDNEY

SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 10.—The state council of the Knights of Columbus will meet in regular quarterly session here tomorrow at 11 o'clock. There are about one hundred delegates here, representing nearly all the local councils in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, there being a large number from Halifax, Moncton and St. John, N. B. The visiting knights were entertained at Glace Bay this afternoon, and are the guests of the Sydney council at annual home, at the Lyceum Theatre this evening. The programme for tomorrow includes services at Sacred Heart Church at 9:15, business session of the council at 11 a. m.

The knights will be entertained to a visit to the steel works in the afternoon, and the programme will be concluded with a banquet at the Sydney Hotel tomorrow evening.

TORONTO IS AS PATRIOTIC AS EVER

TORONTO, May 10.—That a humble petition be presented to the parliament of Canada now in session, urging on the Canadian government some more immediate and practical action this session on behalf of the people in Canada in developing a permanent naval policy, as demonstrating Canada's readiness to strengthen and support the Empire in any crisis of its fortunes, thus giving practical expression to the sentiment and desire of the great mass of Canadian people by sending to the mother country some practical and substantial aid to the defence of the Maritime freedom. The above resolution was carried in the city council today by twelve to three.

DEATH FOLLOWED BLOW STRUCK IN A QUARREL

NORTH BARNSTED, N. H., May 10.—A single blow delivered tonight during a quarrel between Peter Akermann, aged 55 years and Oliver Foss, 35 years old, was followed by Akermann's death. The short shuttle took place in the main road of the town, in front of Akermann's door, according to witnesses, and the body remained there for five hours tonight, surrounded by a small crowd of curious people, awaiting the coming of the coroner. No arrest was made pending the arrival of deputy sheriff.

BOSTON, Mass., May 10.—Eaton Takahira, the Japanese Ambassador, arrived in Boston late today from New Haven and went immediately to the home of former assistant secretary of the treasury, Chas. S. Hamlin, whose guest he will be while in Boston.

Tomorrow morning at the home of Mr. Hamlin, in the presence of the entire suite of the Japanese Embassy, and the attaché, Baron Takahira will present President Chas. W. Eliot, of Harvard University, the emblem of the Order of the Rising Sun, the Emperor of Japan having recently conferred that distinction on President Eliot.
