SEEKERS OF TITLES,
SAYS LADY LAURIE

First Thing Which Americans Do Is To Buy a Title

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Mar. 1.—"Is there democracy in the social life of America?" asked Lady Laurier today with a smile, suggesting incredulous astonishment. She was answering the question as to how she, the possessor of a title, harmonized her situation of being the wife of the Canadian Premier. "I haven't observed anything, deplorable in the ideas of America," she continued. "I don't say that it isn't novel enough. Americans display a far greater eagerness and awe for royal prerogatives than do Europeans. 'What is the ideal of America?'" "When you are successful, the first thing you buy is a title. There is a great market for them here. The titled Europeans need the money, require it, in fact, but the Americans should have no use for titles. For myself, I do not believe in such marriages. I think Americans should marry at home and Europeans do likewise."

LORD MOUNT STEPHEN
TO AID IMMIGRATION

\$300,000 in Securities Placed in Trust to Foster British Immigration into Canada

MONTREAL, Mar. 1.—Lord Mount Stephen has again demonstrated his interest in Canadian affairs in a practical way. Securities amounting to \$300,000 in value, with a yearly earning power of \$18,000, have been placed in the hands of a trust, who will administer the funds to foster desirable British immigration into Canada. The trustees are: Mr. Robert Melghe, Mr. John Turnbull and the Royal Trust Company. Dr. Earnest Homes, National Incorporated Association, will be the medium through which his lordship's ideas will be carried out. The best class of homeless boys in the care of that institution will be sent to Canada, where so many opportunities await them.

AFTER EARL GREY'S SCALP

MONTREAL, Mar. 1.—Mr. Bourassa's paper, Le Devoir, tonight publishes an attack on the Governor General, in which it declares that Earl Grey's conduct is a menace to the constitutional rights of the Canadian people, and that the secretary of state for the colonies should be asked to recall him at once. Le Devoir claims the crown as represented by Earl Grey is usurping the rights of the people and that the Governor General is abusing the prestige of his position by entering upon an imperial campaign.

AMERICAN TARIFF MEN
WILL ARRIVE THURSDAY

Government Will Place All Desirable Information at Their Disposal

OTTAWA, Ont., Mar. 1.—The Canadian government was officially notified from Washington today that Messrs. Emery and Pender, two members of the United States tariff advisory board, will arrive in Ottawa on Thursday. In connection with the members of the government in regard to the applicability of the maximum clause of the American tariff to Canada. It is expected that they will remain here for several days. The members of the government will afford them the fullest opportunity for a free and frank discussion of all matters bearing on their mission to the Canadian capital. Any suggestions they may make with a view to obviating any difficulties in the way of reaching of an amicable and mutually satisfactory understanding so as to prevent a tariff war will be sympathetically and courteously considered by the government here.

WILL DECIDE WHERE
KELLEY WAS NABBED

BOSTON, Mass., March 1.—In response to a communication from Ambassador Bryce to the State Department that representation had been made to him that William J. Kelley of Richmond, N.B., who has been sentenced in the United States district court to fourteen years in the Federal prison at Atlanta for smuggling and assault on a Federal official, was captured on New Brunswick's soil and carried into Maine, A. T. Bagley, special agent of the Washington department of justice, went to Maine to-day to make thorough investigation. After a conference with district attorney Whitehouse, who prosecuted the case at Portland, and taking a deposition from Deputy Marshal Stevens, who captured Kelley, he left for Aroostook and Carleton Counties to take depositions and make investigations on both sides of the border.

FREDERICTON, Mar. 1.—At the session of the legislature this afternoon Provincial Secretary Fleming submitted to the house an account of the expenditures and receipts of the province from the close of the fiscal year up to the opening of the legislature. GAGLIOSTRO WAS THE
MOST FAMOUS FAKIR

Pretended He Was Present at the Crucifixion

Fooled Whole World—Invented Liquor Which He Claimed Restored Lost Youth—Grew Rich from It

"A liar of the first magnitude, though outspaced in all the provinces of Italy by what one may call the king of liars!" Thus wrote grim old Thomas Carlyle the victim on whom he showered such abuse was Count Alessandro di Cagliostro, master of a thousand names, who lived in the New York Evening World. Even the man's high sounding name was a fake. He was really Giuseppe Balsania, a Sicilian peasant's son and in no way entitled to call himself Cagliostro, as a mere child, was expelled from the local charity school for some abominable bit of mischief. He went into a Palermo monastery; where he found work in the monk's apothecary about the year 1760. He showed a positive genius for medicine, and soon knew more about chemistry and the use of poisons than any other cleric in the whole brotherhood. Incidentally he learned, too, a few great truths that always proved invaluable to doctors and showmen alike. He found out that many people trust physicians as they trust no one else. Also, that a large percentage of the public are really fooled by any nonsense which is enough to attract them. On these two human failings the liar built his future career of gigantic swindling.

SOLD MYTHICAL TREASURE.

So, when a feat of audacious blarney on his part led him to be kicked out of the monastery, he was ready to start upon his career. To provide himself with ready money for his tour of Italy he tricked a rich Sicilian into buying from him, at a large price, the secret of a treatment which did not exist. Driven out of Sicily, he wandered through Europe and the Orient, perfecting himself in the best art of all the fakery he met on the way and swindling every simple-minded traveler he met. Then, with a certain beautiful young girl whom he had married in Rome, he landed in London, where he discovered the miraculous liquor which he called "wine of Egypt," and which he asserted, would prolong and restore youth. Pointing to his lovely young wife, he related that she had recently been a victim of the disease of 80 and had been made a girl again by one draught of "wine of Egypt."

He himself, he said, had lived for 2,000 years by constantly drinking this wine. He told, as an eyewitness, about events that had happened many centuries before, and described the scriptural marriage feast at Cana in Galilee, at which, he said, he had been an honored guest. He also related that he had been present at the Crucifixion, and he used to burst into reminiscences at the sight of a crucifix.

TRAVELLED IN GILDED CHARIOT.

People listened greedily to Cagliostro's absurd lies. Through the sale of his "wine of Egypt" he had won a place in a gilded chariot with a retinue of servants, and he travelled all over the world with one to do him honor. He speedily became one of the foremost men of Europe, his wealth and fame still further increased. He next obtained favor and money by establishing Masonic lodges for women. Nor were these the greatest of Cagliostro's impostures. He claimed to be a scoldivine birth, and he had power of rendering himself invisible, and added the information that he could not only make diamonds and other precious stones, but could transform all metals into gold. The swindler was so sure that he should make such assertions that nearly all Europe should believe him. He was, in fact, the greatest of the great deceptions of the world. He had actually seen him make diamonds and turn iron bars into gold.

FORGOTTEN FALL OF BASTILLE.

He was brilliant, but he was too, at an age when hypnotism was thought to be a miraculous power. He went to Paris. There his vast charities made him popular. His boundless wealth backed his assertion that he could make gold. The next hand-made "miracle" that he performed, surrounded the wisest Frenchmen. Prince Cardinal de Rohan, grand almoner of France, and steward of the state, was utterly hoodwinked by him. In fact, Cagliostro has always been suspected of using the cardinal as a dup of the famous—or infamous—affair of the queen's necklaces. As a matter of fact, some of the "miracles" performed by the archliar still defy detection. He forgottend many great events that actually occurred. He readily announced in advance the lucky numbers of the government lotteries. When temporarily locked in the Bastille prison, in 1793, on suspicion of having shared Rohan's supposed guilt in the theft of the diamond necklaces, he wrote on his cell wall. This 25th cell should be destroyed and the people shall dance on the site." In three years this prophecy was fulfilled.


COLON, March 1.—President Obaldia of Panama died to-day following an illness of several weeks with heart failure.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.
Any person who is the sole holder of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may now obtain a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by any agent, or certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intending homesteader.

Notice—Six month's residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres soily owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of available Dominion land in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duplicates—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 40 acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duplicates—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
