ANXIETY AS RESULT OF KING'S DEATH

New York, May 7.—The brief Saturday sessions of stock exchanges on the continent of Europe and in New York further curtailed in the latter case by the early adjournment were long enough to give opportunity for a demonstration of financial confidence in the situation left by the sudden death of the King of England. No exchanges were opened in Great Britain which of course the most direct effects of the event would be felt but it is not to be supposed that other financial markets would be exempt from the effect to be looked for in the home markets.

Allowance must be made for the part played by supporting orders by the stronger financial interests in the day's advance in New York prices. With this allowance made, the market gave clear evidence that no severe pressure was encountered to oppose the support. The longer view of the changes involved will be awaited, nevertheless, with close attention. Clear opinions are lacking yet of the effects to follow on the critical political situation in England. The immediate effect on the extended rubber speculation in London also will be watched for with some anxiety.

No attention was paid to general conditions, although the American Railway Association reported a further increase in surplus freight cars to 96,319, the largest showing of idle equipment since September first of last year.

The bank statement explained the easing tone of the money market by the substantial recuperation which has been effected in the condition of the banks. Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value \$1,075,000.

United States bonds were unchanged on call during the week.

ALLOWANCE FOR CADETS

Dominion Government Will Pay \$1 Per Member to Instructors of Corps of 30 and Over.

Ottawa, May 7.—An important note respecting the training of cadet corps has been gazetted. It deals with the allowances and is as follows:

For the training of a cadet corps during the school year subject to the certificate of a military inspecting officer, the corps has an enrolled strength of less than 25 cadets—no allowance.

From 25 to a maximum of 50 cadets—\$1.00 per cadet.

Where there are school teachers qualified as cadet instructors, a teacher-instructor will be detailed to each company of 50 cadets for their instruction in military training and musketry.

In the event of there being but one teacher properly qualified to instruct cadets and more than one company of cadets connected with the educational institution regular instruction will be paid him, a further allowance may be paid him as follows:

For each additional cadet over 50 up to 100—75 cents.

For each cadet in excess of 100—50 cents per cadet.

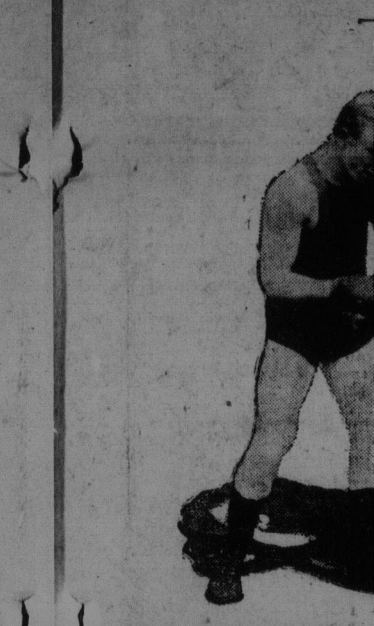
