PLEASANT POINT FERRY CONDUCTED AT A LOSS

Lancaster Ferry Commissioners hear Application of Mr. Leonard for Increased Grant.

A meeting of the Lancaster ferry commissioners was held yesterday afternoon at which the whole question of the Indiantown-Pleasant Point ferry was thoroughly discussed.

Mr. Leonard presented his side of the case and the commissioners decided to ask him to prepare a statement showing the cost of operation and receipts for the last two years, and if the commission were satisfied that he was running the ferry at a loss they would vote him a certain sum out of moneys on hand to make up the loss until the first of May next.

The commissioners have about \$1,600 on hand which was earned when the ferry was a paying proposition, and this could be used to make up any deficit until it was all gone when other arrangements would have to be made.

The provincial government were approached about a subsidy, but the delegation was informed that a subsidy could not be given for a ferry, and it was up to the governing bodies of the city and Lancaster to provide the service.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duration—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a term of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Pre-emption—Six months residence in each of three years after having homesteaded in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Pre-emption rights may be exercised in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$50.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of drought, scarcity of stock land, live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
